**City Treasury Deficit.**

The citizens of Rochester were astounded Saturday afternoon last at learning that City Treasurer John A. Davis was a defaulter. John Bower was employed to examine the accounts of the office some weeks since. Thursday he struck a trial balance and found there should be \$401,871.98 cash on hand. The cash was minus, however. Of this about \$40,000 will probably be made good. Where the other \$61,777.18 went, no one knows, and the ex-treasurer refuses to explain. Mr. Davis has tendered his resignation, which has not as yet been accepted. He has turned over to the finance committee of the Common Council all his real estate and personal property. His bondsmen, James Fee, C. T. Crouch, S. V. McDowell and S. G. Steele, will make up the remainder of the deficit. The amount of Mr. Davis' bond was \$50,000. He was a very popular man, and serving his second term as city treasurer. Extremely courteous, affable, and generous to a fault, Mr. Davis was a man who made hosts of friends. Had he been less good-hearted, it is not likely he would be in the position he is today. Alderman Thayer, as chairman of the finance committee of the Common Council, will act as city treasurer until Mr. Davis' successor is chosen.

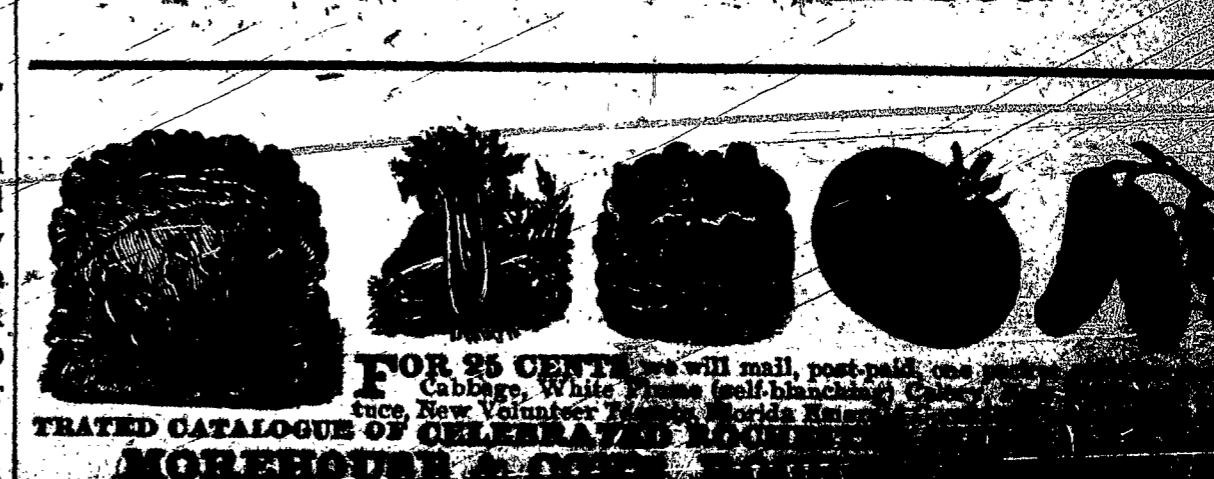
