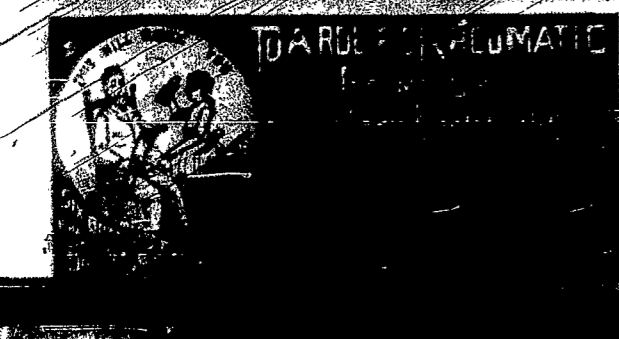

 When Daniel O'Connell, the Irish patriot, was at the height of his celebrity, he visited a college in the South of Ireland. The schoolboys were delighted, and one of them, a boy noted for his oratorical gifts, was chosen by his fellows to make an address of welcome to the patriot. The little orator was good-looking, fervid, and auburn-haired. He captured the heart of the great liberator. A few years afterwards O'Connell was engaged to speak at a hall in one of the principal towns. A tremendous crowd gathered to hear him. No one would be admitted without a ticket. As the time for the address to begin drew near, a youth modestly presented himself at the door, and though he had no ticket he asked to be admitted. But the door-keepers were obdurate. The youth, however, contrived to send word to the liberator that he wished to see him personally. He was admitted to the presence of the national leader; and in a few words told who he was and what he desired.  
 "Oh! you are the little red-haired boy that greeted me so splendidly in college," the patriot cried. "Indeed you shall get in, and you shall have one of the best seats, too." He was equal to his word, and one of the liberator's most enthusiastic auditors that night was the auburn-haired youth.  
 The youth has since those old days himself become widely celebrated as an orator and a leader of men. All this country knows him. His name is Patrick John Ryan. He is the Catholic Archbishop of Philadelphia. *The Working Boy.*

That she is between the age of fifteen and sixty years. 4. That as soon as she fails to conform with the requirements of the Church, she ceases to be a member. 5. That she must become an honorary member before joining the Beneficiary Department. Insurance qualifications: 1st. That she is between the age of eighteen and fifty years. 2d. That the statements favorable to her bodily health are correct. 3d. That if any of the above statements made by her be incorrect, she will agree to forfeit all right and claim to any benefit that may accrue to her from the association.
