OUR BOYS' AND GIRLS' CORNER.

A Day-Book.

Some boys and girls spend every cent they receive on candy, toys and trifles; others save every cent, with a vague idea of amassing a fortune. Neither of these methods is to be commended. The real value and proper use of money is to purchase enjoyment, and it is equally wrong to squander or hoard.

Money should always be expended to advantage, and that involves prudence in earning, spending and saving.

A prudent boy will buy nothing that he does not need, and he will always buy the best for his money. He will learn to "shop" as the girls do—that is, look around until he is quite certain that some other article will not suit him better.

Perhaps the greatest check on reckless or foolish expenditure is a day-book. How many boys know what that is or have used one?

We know of a bright boy who has for three years kept a day-book in which he entered every cent that passed through his hands. All money that he earns or receives from any source is entered in the credit column, and all money expended during the day is set down in the debit column. Every week the book is balanced.

It requires about five or ten minutes in the evening of each day to set down the items of daily expenditure, and perhaps fifteen minutes at the end of the week to balance the book.

The value of this book is two-fold. It shows a boy "where his money is gone," without any scratching of his ear or knitting of his brow, and it also acts as a check on foolish expenditure.

When he foots up his "debits" at night he will be ashamed to enter "candy" or "cigarettes" three or four times, and the next day when he is tempted he will think of his day-book and refrain.

You can save money by keeping a day-book, because the little items count up in a way that surprise you and instruct you. And it does not have a tendency to make you stingy or mean; on the contrary, it gives you more money to spend on actual necessities. And it inculcates business habits that may be of great value in after life.

To the girls these remarks equally apply. As a rule they are not tempted to useless expenditure like their brothers, but no doubt they spend many a dollar foolishly, which they could save by keeping a day-book.

At any rate, the experiment is worth trying.—*Golden Days.*

Pope Leo's Tomb.

In the studio of Signor Luchetto, in Rome, may be seen the model of the tomb of Pope Innocent III, and that of Leo XIII. will be modeled to harmonize with it in every respect, as they will occupy the recesses, right and left of the grand triumphal arch, of the apse of St. John Lateran. This magnificent work of art, which will form his cenotaph, will be erected at the expense of Leo XIII. The whole will be in white marble except the sarcophagus, on which will be the recumbent figure of the Pope. That will be of red porphyry. Above and filling up the arch will be our Lord, with St. Dominic and St. Francis; below the sarcophagus, right and left of the door leading into the ambulatory which surrounds the apse, will be fine figures of a Crusador and of Religion. The design of this sumptuous sepulchre is in severe early Renaissance, and will rise to the height of about thirty feet from the floor. The sepulchre of Leo XIII. will resemble it in every respect except that, of course, the saints and attendant figures will be different. The same sculptor has in hand a colossal sitting figure of the present Pontiff, which is nearly completed, for one of the halls in the Propaganda, and a replica is ordered for Washington, in America, for the Catholic University. The sculptor, Luchino, is from Perugia.

Stewart, addressed the members in an affecting manner on the importance of the sacrament they had just received, and then urged all the men of the congregation who were not members to become such as soon as possible.

Valentine Ruf died Monday at No. 25 Rauber street, aged 27 years. The deceased was a member of the Rochester benevolent association, and extremely popular among a large circle of acquaintances. He leaves a wife and two children. His father, Thomas Ruf, his mother, four brothers and four sisters also survive him. The funeral took place at nine a. m. Wednesday from St. Michael's church.
