Many Items of Interest To Rochester Catholics. Bishop McQuaid will administer Confirmation at the Holy Redeemer church to-morrow afternoon.

J. H. Foley has been elected a director of the Genesee Valley Railway Company.

The annual commencement exercises of Nazareth Academy will be held on the 25th of June.

The street car company is pushing its new track-laying on State street toward Main street as fast as it can.

Misses Mary and Sarah McDonald and Miss Anna McAuley assisted at Miss Martha Hartley's recital Wednesday evening.

The pattern house in the rear of N. H. Galusha's foundry on Court street was damaged by fire to the extent of about \$300 Thursday morning.

Chairman Ambruster of the Executive Board has been notified that the repairs on the West avenue lift bridge will be completed in about three weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. Burkhardt of Buffalo are at the Powers. They are on their wedding tour and will start tomorrow for a six weeks' trip in the east, after which they will take up their residence in the Breezy city.

H. Trentman and Emil Rashdorf, two members of the St. Cecilia singing society, returned from a trip to Buffalo Thursday evening and were greeted by the S. W. Club. A pleasant evening was passed. Mr. Rashdorf rendered musical selections and Messrs. J. Heilman and H. Trentman gave recitations.

A strike has been in progress in the P. Cox shoe factory for a couple of weeks. Some 350 hands are involved. The strikers object to the introduction of certain machinery and Mr. Cox intends to use the machinery. The members of the firm say they have all the new hands they want; the strikers deny this fact. Thus the matter stands.

An event of considerable interest is the tennis tournament of the Rochester club held on the grounds this week. The Flower City tennis players are enthusiastic and endeavor to have their prize contests attended by crack players. This year the Middle States championship was decided here. The trophy was a \$500 cup of magnificent workmanship and handsome design.

The Rochester Railway company will build a power house on Center street between Brown's race and Mill street. Work will be commenced at once, and a building erected as soon as possible. It will be of brick, fire-proof, one story high with an iron roof. Power for all the electric lines will be furnished from this station and there will also be a repair department. The site is peculiarly well fitted for the use to which it is to be put.

Rev. Dr. E. J. Hanna, celebrated solemn high mass at the Cathedral last Sunday. Bishop McQuaid preached on the feast of Corpus Christi. A Distinguished Visitor

Another distinguished visitor was the guest of Bishop McQuaid this week and honored the cathedral by his presence at last Sunday's services. It was Most Rev. N. Donnelly, Bishop of Canea and Coadjutor Archbishop of Dublin, Ireland. His Grace has been on a visit to Australia and landed in San Francisco a few weeks since. He has been visiting in this country since and will sail for Europe in a short time. Bishop Donnelly is a great leader in the movement for the use of Gaelic in all Catholic churches. In the Diocesan Synod of Dublin in 1879 a commission of priests was appointed to take charge of the decrees enacted with regard to the music to be thenceforward allowed in the churches of the diocese and the decree appointing the commission commanded and prescribed "that three months from the publication of this synod no music or singing be employed in the churches, either of secular, regular or nuns, which shall not have been approved of by this commission."

Bishop Donnelly was chosen president of the commission and the result of the labors of the organization was embodied in a pamphlet containing a list of the music permitted to be sung in the churches throughout the diocese of Dublin.

The list of music compiled by the Dublin commission has been adopted by Bishop McQuaid for use in the diocese of Rochester.
