Catholic Society Notes.

The annual convention of the German Catholic Societies of Connecticut will be held in Meriden on July 26th.

The thirty-sixth anniversary of the Young Men's Catholic Association of St. Patrick's cathedral, Newark, N. J., was celebrated June 11.

Branch 175, C. M. B. A., of Ambury, gave a banquet in honor of Dr. M. P. Conway and M. S. Goss, Thursday evening. They leave next Monday for Europe and will be absent about two months.

Pittsburg Federation of Catholic Societies are making extraordinary efforts to have an immense parade in that city on July 4th. Catholic Societies from Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Wheeling and other cities are expected to participate.

The dedication of a grand banner made for the Beethoven Singing Society by a Milwaukee lady will take place Monday, June 23. All the German singing societies of the city will be present. The banner is a very handsome one. The dedication will take place at Germania hall.
