Monstrous Power of Sea Breakers. From experiments made last month at All Rock and Skerryvole lighthouses, on th coast of Scotland, it was found that whe the force of the breakers on the sidef the German ocean may be taken at aput a ton and a half to every square foot f exposed surface, the Atlantic side frows breakers with double that force, three tons to the square foot; thus a grace of only two square yards sustains blow from a heavy Atlantic breaker to al to fifty four tons.

Black Hills Tin Mint.

Joseph Hare, editor of The in Miner, of Hill City, S. D., in speaking the tin mines at that place, says: "Hill City is situated exactly in the conter style in belt, which is in the shape of half moon, and is about thirty miles in ingth and three miles wide. We are twintyeight miles from Rapid City, the parest railroad point.

"The richness of these mines is simply wonderful, and one who has not been there can hardly believe it, but I state fact when I tell you that there is enough tin on the dumps and in sight now to supply the United States for five years. As soon as the big mill is started at Hill City we shall then be able to ship the tin out in bars. Some of these mines have been pushed down 240 feet, and the deeper the richer.


Boys Capture & Thief.


