VERITABLE DEMOCRATIC AVA -LANCHE - WISCONSIN REPU-DIATES THE BENNETT LAW.

Next Congress will Contain a Larger Dem ocratic Majority Than the Republicans Will Have Members-A Democrat Will be United States Senator from New York-Judge Kinney's Great Run.

The election is over and the country will have peace for a time. The result Tuesday was a sweeping victory for the Democratic party. The next House of Congress will have a Democratic majority of 130, a change of 135 members. McKinley, the author of the famous tariff bill, was beaten in his district in Ohio by a majority of about 250. Henry Cabot Lodge, election bill, was re-elected from his district in Massachusetts, but by a majority decreased from some 6.000 to 1,000. This practically insures the abandonment of the Force bill.
