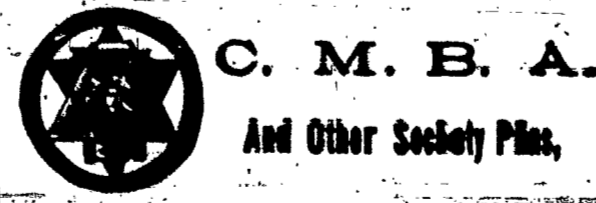

The first indication of a boil is a slight itching, followed by a reddish pimple with a hair in the center. Sometimes the pulling out of this hair will arrest the development of the sore. As the pimple grows the redness extends and becomes more intense, and the part begins to throb with pain. In about five days it breaks, pus comes out, the pain abates, and soon after the dead tissue the so called "core"—escapes, followed by rapid healing. Sometimes no core appears, nor does the boil suppurate. This is known as the "blind boil." It is very hard and painful, and is long in healing.—Youth's Companion.

A Natural Picture.
