The Nazareth Reading Circle had a pleasant entertainment at Nazareth Academy Thursday evening. An excellent programme was rendered.

Special Christmas music is being rehearsed by all the choirs. At St. Patrick's Cathedral Franz Liszt's "Missa Choralis" will be sung at the midnight Mass as follows: "Adeste Fidelis," with ringing of bell until procession reaches the altar. Introit, "Dominus dixit ad me," Gregorian, rendered by the sanctuary choir composed of 35 students of St. Andrew's seminary; "Kyrie" and "Gloria," Liszt, Cathedral choir; Graduale "Te-cum Principium," Bonn, sanctuary choir; "Credo," Liszt; Offertorium "Laetentur Coeli," Stehle; Sanctus, Benedictus, Agnus Dei, Liszt, Cathedral choir; Communio "In Splendoribus Sanctorum." At the High Mass the same Mass will be sung with the same composers, with the following exceptions: Graduale "Viderunt Omnes," Offertorium "Tui Sunt Soeli," Communio, "Viderunt Omnes." At the close the congregation will unite in singing "Holy God." The Cathedral choir is composed of 40 voices; the sanctuary choir of the students of St. Andrew's seminary; Prof. Eugene Bonn is director and Miriam Loughlin organist.

At the church of the Immaculate Conception, Mozart's Tenth Mass, with full orchestral accompaniment, will be sung, under the direction of M. L. Hughes, Miss Sullivan organist.

At the French church of Our Lady of Victory a grand Caecilian Mass will be sung with full orchestra under the leadership of F. S. Minges.

The mentioning of the Forty Hours Adoration of the French church was unintentionally omitted in our last issue.

A great treat is in store for the Catholics, in fact all citizens, of Rochester, January 6th and 8th. Rev. J. H. Conroy, rector of the Cathedral, Ogdensburg, editor of the *Currier* and vice-president of the American Catholic Press Association, will lecture in Cathedral hall for the benefit of the Cathedral school fund. The subjects for the lectures will be "Christian and Pagan Rome," and "Paris," and will be illustrated by stereopticon views. There will be shown in the first the Forum and its ruins, Circus Maximus, the Baths of Caracalla, the triumphal arches, the Castle of St. Angelo, the Appian Way, the Coliseum will be re-peopled, the Gladiators, the Charioteers and Martyrs take their places in the arena. The various Basilicas will be shown interiorly and exteriorly; the Vatican Museum and marvelous library, also the holy staircase which Christ ascended in the house of Pilate on Holy Thursday night; it was brought from Jerusalem by St. Helena, mother of Constantine the Great; The Paris lecture will embrace the principal churches, monuments and public buildings of the great French metropolis; a visit will also be made to the monastery of St. Denis where the royal families of France lie buried; thence to Fontainebleau and Versailles, the richest palaces perhaps in on earth; the scenes of the French Revolution will stand in living light upon the canvass; the great Napoleon will appear in the battle of Austerlitz and again in that of Waterloo; his farewell to his troops, his last hours in St. Helena, and his tomb under the dome of the Invalides, will each greet the eye of the visitor. Father Conroy is an enchanting speaker and should be heard by large audiences. Tickets will be placed on sale after Christmas.
