It is doubtful if there is in the United States a priest whose character, attainments and labors rank higher than those of the distinguished ecclesiastic named above. He was among the many who at the time of the Tractarian movement, nearly fifty years ago, felt the call of divine grace to leave Episcopalianism and enter the bosom of the Catholic Church.

His first ministerial work as a priest was in humble country missions; then he was placed in charge of the important city mission of St. Ann. But whether in country, or in city, he was ever the same devoted priest, scholar, in the pulpit, dignified and self-respecting as a citizen, but, always and everywhere, true and loyal to his order and his ecclesiastical superiors.

In November last, on the fortieth anniversary of Mgr. Preston's ordination, his brother priests and the members of St. Ann's parish, thought the opportunity an auspicious one to testify publicly and substantially the high regard and cordial affection entertained by them for their esteemed brother priest and zealous pastor.

Forty-three years ago yesterday our Rt. Rev. Bishop was ordained a priest of the Roman Catholic Church. All our readers know the work he has accomplished both as priest and bishop. In the former capacity, in addition to his sacerdotal labors, he built and placed upon a solid basis Seton Hall College; since his erection to the epis-

you have been the model of every priestly virtue and accomplishment. Although burdened with the many cares of the pastor, and of the administrator, you have found time to cultivate sacerdotal science.

You have defended the faith, and promoted piety by works which attest the eloquent orator and scholarly writer. Death and Funeral of the Esteemed Pastor of Groton.

Rev. P. McManus, of Groton, died Thursday, after a lingering illness. The deceased priest was born in Bricklins, County Mayo, Ireland, and was forty-eight years of age.

The funeral took place from the Immaculate Conception Church, Ithaca, N. Y., Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. The divine office was chanted by the priests before the Mass. The chanters of the office were Revs. Eugene Pagani and Charles Flaherty. Solemn High Mass was sung by Revs. T. F. Hickey of Moravia, celebrant, Pagani, of Penn Yan, deacon, J. Hendricks, of Livonia, subdeacon, and P. J. Clunie, of Auburn, master of ceremonies.

In the sanctuary were Rt. Rev. B. J. McQuaid, Very Rev. W. J. Seymour of Auburn, Revs. English of Canandaigua, Madden of Trumansburg, O'Connell of Ovid, Mulleron of Auburn, Donohue of Weedsport, T. A. Hendricks of Union Springs, Kavanaugh of Lyons, O'Neill of Seneca Falls, Dougherty of Stanley, Dannelly of Victor, Netzel of Auburn, FitzSimons of Lima, Rauber of Dansville, Flaherty of Mt. The Rt. Rev. Bishop, before the last absolution, addressed the large congregation present on the dignity and responsibility of the priesthood, and

praised the life of the dead priest, who had been during his years in the ministry always faithful in the discharge of the duties assigned to him. He was ordained in June, 1876, and was assigned the following July to the pastorate of Groton, of which place he was pastor up to the time of his death.

The bearers were Revs. T. A. Hendricks, Madden, M. Joyce, Rauber, Donnelly and T. Hickey. Before the remains were taken from Groton, Solemn High Mass was chanted at the deceased priest's former church by Revs. T. O'Connell of Ovid celebrant; T. Hendricks of Union Springs, deacon; J. Ruby of Auburn, sub-deacon; T. Hickey of Moravia, master of ceremonies.

He then proceeded quietly to Fine Ridge, where he took part in the discussion of affairs. He it was who advised that the Indians be sent to the Bad Lands after the braves who were still out.

He had numerous opponents in his work, and more than once his life has been threatened. He is almost a dead shot at long range, even with a revolver, and on one occasion he thoroughly satisfied a man who wanted to fight with him by simply sinking with a shot from his revolver a chip which floated far out on the river.

The Finest Church on the Pacific Coast.
St. Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco is the largest and finest church edifice on the Pacific coast, and was dedicated on the 11th inst. It took several years to complete the structure. The building cost \$300,000. The sermon at high mass was preached by Bishop J. L. Spaulding of Peoria, and Archbishop Gross preached in the evening. The dedication was celebrated by Archbishop Riordan. Many prominent State and municipal officials were present, as well as Catholic clergymen from all parts of the Pacific coast.

A Monument to "the Orphan's Friend."

In New Orleans there stands a statue erected by public subscription, with these words upon it: "Margaret, the Orphan's Friend." Margaret Haughery was her name. She was of Irish descent, and at first was a servant in the Sisters' Orphan Asylum. She then started a dairy and subsequently a bakery, all the profits of which she devoted to the orphans. The monument, designed by Alexander Doyle, was erected in 1884, three years after her death.
