DOES IT LOOK WARLIKE?

SECRETARY BLAINE'S REPLY TO PREMIER RUDINI.
He Does Not "Recognize" that the Families of the Massacred Italians Are Entitled to Indemnity from the Federal Government—The Secretary's Position in the New Orleans Incident Firmly Unshaken.
WASHINGTON, April 16.—Secretary of State Blaine's reply to Premier Rudini's last official utterance respecting the Italian incident, was completed and handed to Marquis Rudini Tuesday.
Mr. Secretary of State: I listen to acknowledge the receipt of the note which your excellency did me the honor to address to me on the 1st inst., in reply to that whereby Baron Fava informed you of his departure on leave.
I have laid the contents of your excellency's aforesaid note before the government of the king, and his excellency, the president of the council, his majesty's minister for foreign affairs, has just received me to address the following communication to you:
The government of the King of Italy has asked nothing beyond the prompt institution of judicial proceedings through the regular channels. It would have been absurd to claim the punishment of the guilty parties without the warrant of a judicial tribunal...

and while it is possible that the jury may fail to present indictments, the United States cannot assume that such will be the case.
The United States did not by the treaty with Italy become the insurer of the lives or property of Italian subjects, resident within our territory.
The foreign resident must be content in such cases to assert the same redress that is offered by the law to the citizen; and has no just cause, or complaint or right to ask the interposition of his country if the courts are equally open to him for redress of his injuries.
The treaty in the first, second, third, and fourth articles, clearly guaranteed to the citizens of the contracting powers in the territory of each to equal treatment and to free access to the courts of justice.
Foreign residents are not made a favored class. It is not believed that Italy would desire a more stringent construction of her duty under the treaty.
Whereas the treaty, in fact, upon a foreign resident is not the act of the government or its officers, but of an individual or of a mob, it is believed that no claim for indemnity can justly be made unless it shall be made to appear that the public authorities charged with the peace of the community have connived at the unlawful act, or having timely notice of the threatened danger, have been guilty of such gross negligence as to require the precautions as to amount to complicity.
If, therefore, it should appear that among those killed by the mob at New Orleans there were some Italian subjects who were resident or domiciled in that city, agreeable to our treaty with Italy, and not in violation of our immigration laws, and who were abiding in that city, in the United States, and obeying laws thereof, and of the state of Louisiana, and that public officers charged with the duty of protecting life and property in that city connived at the work of the mob, or upon proper notice or information of threatened danger failed to take any steps for the preservation of the public peace, and afterwards to bring the guilty of the crime, the present would, under such circumstances, feel that a case was established that should be submitted to the consideration of congress with a view to the relief of the families of the Italian subjects who had lost their lives by lawless violence.
Accept, sir, the renewed assurances of my high consideration.

THE SITUATION AT SCOTSDALE.
Families of the Strikers Said to Be Almost Starving.
SCOTSDALE, Pa., April 16.—The strike in the coke region was about a standstill yesterday.
The operators have made further inroads in the ranks of the strikers at certain places, while a number of desertions are reported in others.
The labor leaders say that they will soon have sufficient help to carry on the fight.
The strikers' families are almost starving, while the best they can obtain is cornmeal and bread.
The Frick company claim to have 140 men working at Adelaide and 128 at Leisenring, but admit that they have not gained at Leith, Morwood or Davidson.
There were no evictions yesterday, but more notices to vacate were served and whole families are threatened.
A number of women were arrested yesterday for participating in the raid at Trotter.
A hearing was given yesterday afternoon in Uniontown in the cases of Capt. Schoonmaker against the strike leaders, who are alleged to have instigated the Jimtown riot several weeks ago.
The Whitney works were started yesterday morning with a large force of workmen.
ALBANY, April 16.—The fire in the Taylor building, which started at an early hour yesterday morning, was quenched after an hour's hard work.
