SENATOR ABBOTT'S CAREER John Joseph Childwell Abbott is the son of an Angelican clergyman who settled in St. Andrews, County of Argentinuil Chrehen in the chiefy years of the century. He was born in 1921, being the eldest son. He studied law, was called to be bar and before long took a leading page in the profession in Monstreal He soon became moon as an able counselfor and one of the best authorities on commercial law in the province. He was the legal advisor of nearly all the leading enterprises organiz-

ed in the metropolis of Quebec. Mr. Abbott entered public life as member for Argentenil in the old Canadian sembly in 1859; He was the author of an insolvent act which did much to inenease his renutation as a lawyer and legslator. In 1862 he held office as solicitor general in the Sandfield Macdonald-Scotte administration. He did not howver take that leading part in political ife that from his talents would have been expected. In 1873 he attained a promnance that was doubtless very distasteful dhim. He was Hir Hugh Allan's lawyer and was in this way mixed up in the Paerfie seandal

After forsaking the popular chamber he was in 1886 made a member of the cabinet without portfolid, a senator and leader of that chamber

CANBY'S STRATEGY.

-Hanry Tymail in New York Sun.

We had been celetrating a particularly lively old Fourth of July, 1868, at George burg and while we sincerely mourned the loss of many a brave comrade who had gone down in that hard fought strugglethe severest test and must important butthe of the war in many respects we could not fail to rejoice when the sun rose bright and clear on the morning of the 6th, over a most glorious and happy result.

It is of something which occurred that day that I write this little sketch in me gard to the experience of a lieutenant of the Twenty-third Pennsylvania volumteers, whom I will call Canby, and who was in charge of the Sixth corps ammunition train.

Late on the dight of the 5th Canby was cent for, if my memory serves me correctly, by Major General Wright, commanding the corps. "Lieutenant I want you to take you

ammunition desig and start with the first strenk of duvight, by: the most direct road, for Emmertsburg. You must not start later than 4 o'clock. You must not fail under any circumstances, and the corns coming by Waynesburg will be there to meet you. You shall have a detail of one company of the Twenty-seventh Massa chusens to act as a guard and remove any obstructions. You understand, lieutenant. no failure!"

"It shall be done promptly, general, and the lieutenant departed into one of the worst storms of thunder, lightning and rain that ever followed a heavy battle, and one was always sure to do so.

Emmettsburg, Md., is ten miles from Gattysburg, over a fine roud, through one of the most beautiful agricultural regions conceivable.

Lieutenant Canby gut out his train and his pioneer party on time, and also Lieutenant Langion, the ordnance officer. The storm had passed away, and the ruddy American nation in the eyes of the world over the buttlefield, where blood and ruin and many a yet unburied corpse attested the horrid carnage which had but a few hours before rioted over the now amet
