FEARFULLY FATAL EXPLOSION.

Four Laborers Killed and Five Others Fatally Injured. BUTTE, Mont., Oct. 28.—While a gang of workmen were at work drilling rock on the Pacific extension of the Great Northern road, near Great Falls, Mont., yesterday, a hole in the rock containing some powder became choked with "wash" and the foreman started to drill it out. A spark ignited the powder, causing a terrible explosion.

WILL PROBABLY COMPROMISE.



WALT WHITMAN'S CONDITION.

Death Knocking at the Door of the "Good Gray Poet." NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—A special dispatch from Camden, N. J., this morning says: The condition of Walt Whitman, the "good gray poet," has not materially changed since yesterday. He is gradually growing weaker from the effects of the paralytic stroke with which he was stricken some time ago, and at present is in an almost entirely helpless condition. He is nearly a seventy-three years of age and his feebleness for the past few months has increased to such an extent that his friends here feel greatly alarmed at his present condition.



Notwithstanding the fact that he is rendered physically helpless, his mind still remains clear and active as in past years, and every day he reads and dictates while sitting bolstered up in an easy chair in the bay window of his study in his modest little cottage.
