The Banking Superintendent's Report on the Wrecked Kingston Bank John G. Kenngott Suicides With a Poy Cannon at Buffalo Fire Bugs Captured at Kingston Other State News

KINGSTON N. Y. Nov. 10.-C. M. Pres ton, superintendent of the state banking department has concluded his examination of the Ulster County Savings institution and issued a statement of the condition of the wrecked bank. He finds the amount due depositors to be \$2,374,465,89, and the assets \$2,108,547.39, leaving a deficiency of \$365,918,50.

The examination involved the work of looking over 26,000 individual accounts. The books showed on beginning of the examination that \$1.893.134.52 was due depositors, and at the close that the amount should have been \$2.474.465.89; showing that the amount abstracted or withdrawn by Ostrander and Trumpbour was \$581,-

From Sept. 21, when the run was stopped by reason of the statement of the trustees: until Oct. 2, when the bank was closed by Superintendent Preston, \$82,398.45 was deposited and the payments were. \$59,535.30. Superintendent Preston says the assets are capable of paying 85 per cent. on the deposits. He suggests that the bank could resume on procuring an order from the court permitting it to transact its ordinary business as a savings bank, on condition that 15 per cent, of the aggregate deposit standing to the credit of each depositor on Oct. 2 be charged to the depositors and credited to the bank, and that no portion of the percentage so charged and credited be paid or payable to any such depositor until the further order of the

That 25 per cent, be paid to each depositor on demand from the time that the bank resumes, and the court could be moved from time to time to pay such additional sums until the 85 per cent. should be paid in full. He says in this way the officers would be enabled gether with the earnings, would within a reasonable time pay the 85 per cent., and with the co-operation of the depositors, together with such new business as the bank would naturally command, the full amount would eventually be raid. Suicided With a Toy Cannon.

BUFFALO, Nov. 11.—John G. Kenngott, an old and respected German, who lived: with his wife and son-in-law at 583 Spring Rosaries Grucifies. Holy-Water Fonts street, committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself with a toy cannon. He was 65 years old and a blacksmith. His home life was a happy one, it is said, but he was well advanced in years, and his mind for the last two or three months had become noticably impaired. He acted strangely, but was not violent, and his suicide was a severe shock to his friends.

Says He Fired Buildings.

KINGSTON, N. Y., Nov. 11.-John Kouhout, 24 years old, and John McCann, 19 years old, both members of the local fire company, were arrested vesterday charged with firing barns and outbuildings. Kouhout confessed to having set fire to half a dozen buildings during three months and implicates McCann. The latter denies all connection with the matter. They will have an examination on Friday.
