Vital Statistics.

The report of Health Officer Burke for June shows that during that month there were 314 births, 113 marriages and 153 deaths in the city. Twenty-seven, or one-sixth of the decedents, were under one year. The principal causes of death were: Accident 11, apoplexy 4, consumption 25, convulsions 5, croup 5, heart disease 9, meningitis 11, marasmus 6, old age 18, pneumonia 6, peritonitis 5, paralysis 4. Of the 25 persons who died of consumption during the month 16 were females. Of the nine who died from heart disease seven were males. The mortality for June during the last six years was: 1887, 155; 1888, 163; 1889, 150; 1890, 181; 1891, 201; 1892, 163.
