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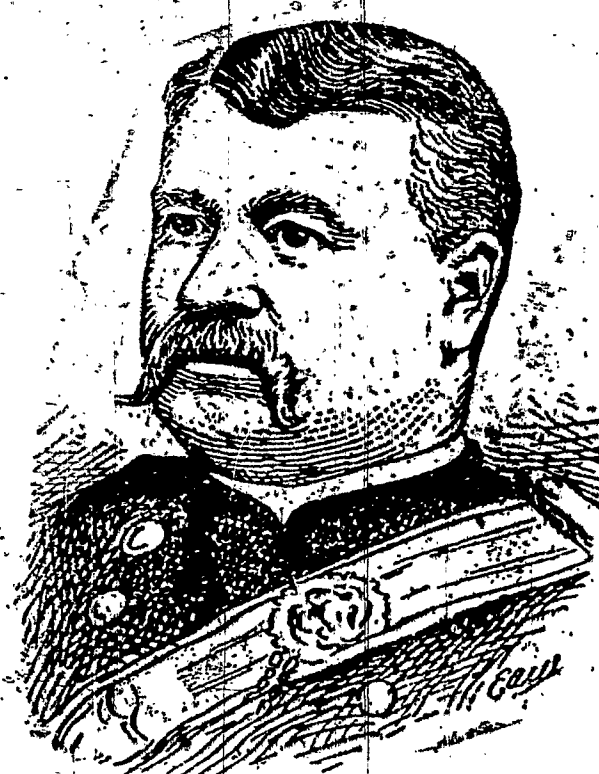

## C. M. B. A.

COLONEL H. N. SCHLICK.

Colonel Henry N. Schlick is a member of Branch 81 and is now serving his second term as marshal for that Branch. He has been appointed Chief Marshal of the parade to be given Tuesday evening. The Colonel is about 50 years of age. He is commander of the Roman Catholic Uniform Union.

Captain Schlick enlisted August 4, 1892, as a private in Company K, 130th New York volunteers which afterwards changed to First New York Dragoons. He won his way step by step, from private to captain taking active part in numerous engagements. At the engagement of Todd's tavern, Captain Schlick acted as aide-de-camp to General Gibbs, commanding the Third Brigade, and had command of Company H in several engagements. At the battle of Newtown he was severely wounded in the right elbow, and about the same time was prostrated by fever. After spending a short time in the hospital at Baltimore and Minneapolis, he was put on detached service and sent to Springfield, Ill., where for a short time he had command of a detachment of cavalry, and was afterward A. A. adjutant general of that post. He was in Springfield at the time of the funeral of the lamented Lincoln, and was chosen one of the officers of the funeral escort. Captain Schlick continued in the service until mustered out with the officers of the regiment, July 18, 1865. Colonel Schlick is also past commander of the G. A. R., of New York state. He was also on the brigade staff of the local G. A. R., and has held other positions of prominence.



CHARLES M. BAYER.

Charles M. Bayer, the genial chancellor of Branch 81, was born in the First Ward in 1861 and he is the son of ex-Chief Engineer Wendell Bayer of the Fire Department. He was educated at St. Joseph's school, and at the age of 17, accepted a position with the Bartholomay brewing company, leaving there about four years ago to engage in business for himself.

Mr. Bayer joined St. Joseph's branch 81 in 1886 and was its 21st member. At that time the branch was in a spiritless state and without any push or ambition. "Charley" started to work the first meeting, and inside of two months the branch showed material advancement. In the first year he presented the names of 117 new members, the largest increase in any branch in the history of the C. M. B. A., to say nothing of an individual member's work. Branch 81 has also initiated the largest number of members—25—in a single session.

Chancellor Bayer has never missed a single meeting during the five years he has belonged to the branch, a record of which he is very proud. During a period of four months there were no meetings at which

from one to twenty-three candidates for membership. Brother Bayer is justly called the C. M. B. A. "hustler." His friends say he cannot help it, as it is born in him, as his initials "C. M. B." almost signify the order.

William P. Hamlin is a member of Branch 88. He is 32 years old and a native of Rochester. He was educated in St. Mary's school. He is a member of Rochester Council No. 207, O. B. L., the Academy of Sciences, Active hose, the Eleventh Ward Democratic club, and the Commercial club. He was appointed by ex-President Cleveland a delegate to represent the state of New York at the International Exposition at Barcelona, Spain.

Mr. Hamlin is the proprietor of the Flower City Watch company. He commenced business in a small way and worked up until now he has a large establishment on a sound financial basis. He is eminently a self-made man.

Brother Crowley was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., Sept. 4, 1860, and is therefore thirty-two years of age. For the past twelve years he has been a resident of this city. During this time he has followed the clothing business. Personally Brother Crowley is beloved by his friends and respected by his acquaintances. A gentleman at all times, his manner is courteous and pleasing. A zealous Catholic, he takes a deep interest in everything pertaining to his religion, and takes particular pride in the work of Corpus Christi parish, of which he is a member.

Brother C's connection with the C. M. B. A. dates from the institution of Branch 139, in August, 1889. He was elected president of the new Branch, and re-elected the following December. At the State Convention in Binghamton two years ago Brother Crowley was the delegate from Branch 139, and is also a delegate to the next week's Convention.
