CARDINAL HOWARD.

Cardinal Edward Howard died at Brighton Sept. 18 of pneumonia. One of the most interesting sketches of the dead Cardinal is that published by the Catholic News.

His Eminence Edward Howard, Cardinal priest of the Catholic Church, was born at Nottingham on February 13, 1829.

His graceful and dignified bearing was familiar to frequenters at St. Peter's in which Basilica he held the office of arch-priest's vicar.

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Cardinal Howard's stature was very great, and his appearance in church when celebrating High Mass was extremely majestic and imposing.

Four years ago, at a garden party at Marlborough House, Cardinal Howard was presented to the Queen, who reminded him of the old days when he had frequently cantered beside her carriage in command of her escort of Life Guards.
