MR. SATOLLI'S ADDRESS

We continue this week the publication of the New World's excellent analysis of the address delivered by Mgr. Satolli before the meeting of the Archbishops.

The eighth section of the address affirms the enforcements of the United States regarding the necessity of parochial schools because of the dangers to the faith and morals of Catholic children in the public schools.

The ninth section is simply a restatement, in substance, of the provision of the third Plenary Council of Baltimore for the establishment of parochial schools where possible, and where not possible, then the creation of means for the religious instruction of the Catholic children forced by necessity to attend public schools.

The tenth section merely states that Catholic parents should not be reproached for what? For sending their children to private schools and academies where a better education is given under the direction of religious, or of approved Catholic persons?

The eleventh section says: "It is greatly to be desired, and will be a most happy arrangement, if the Bishop agree with the civil authorities or with the members of the school board, to conduct the school with mutual attention and due consideration for their respective rights."

These are troublesome times for the Church in America, but she will survive them and come out the better for the ordeal.
