ST. MICHAEL'S.

Monday of last week Rev. F. Pascual, rector of St. Michael's, celebrated the feast of his patron saint, St. Fridolin. Infants' Asylum.

Plans for the new infants' asylum to be erected next to the girls' asylum on Clinton street are now ready.

The infants' asylum will be the only institution of the kind in the city. It is designed for babies up to the age of 4 years. The site is 30 feet east of the main building and the two will be connected by an enclosed gallery. The infants' building will be a three-story structure, 46x78 feet. The lower story will be in the style of an English basement, almost on a level with street surface, as the rock bottom at that point comes up nearly to the surface. The materials to be used in building are blue stone with brick trimmings, similar to the main structure. Around the first story on all four sides will be a glass-enclosed gallery, especially designed so that the infants may have the benefit of the sunshine on days when they could not be taken out doors. The structure will face on Clinton street and will set well back from the street line. The heating, ventilation and plumbing are as perfect as modern ingenuity can make them.

On the basement floor will be the kitchen, dining-room and play-rooms. The upper stories will contain the nurseries, wash and bath rooms.
