## Obituary.

Dennis Crowley died at the home of his mother, 36 Cady street, Tuesday evening last, aged 19 years. The death is a peculiarly sad one, as it is the fourth that has taken place in the family since November, 1891. A few years ago the home of Mr. and Mrs. Crowley was one of the happiest and most cheerful in the city. Mr. C. was a man whose sterling worth was appreciated by all who ever enjoyed his friendship, and for years he was one of the most highly respected parishioners of the Immaculate Conception Church. His death, which took place about 8 months ago was preceded by that of a bright, little daughter, Florence. Only a few months after Mr. Crowley had been laid to rest, his son Jeremiah followed, and now the grief-stricken family mourn the loss of another member.

Dennis was an estimable young man, possessed of qualities which endeared him to his associates, and seemed gifted with wisdom rarely granted to one of his years. He was his father's faithful attendant during the latter's trying illness and nobly bore the responsibility thrown upon him since his parent's death. Just previous to his own death he called his brothers, sisters and mother up his bedside and gave each an affectionate good-bye. 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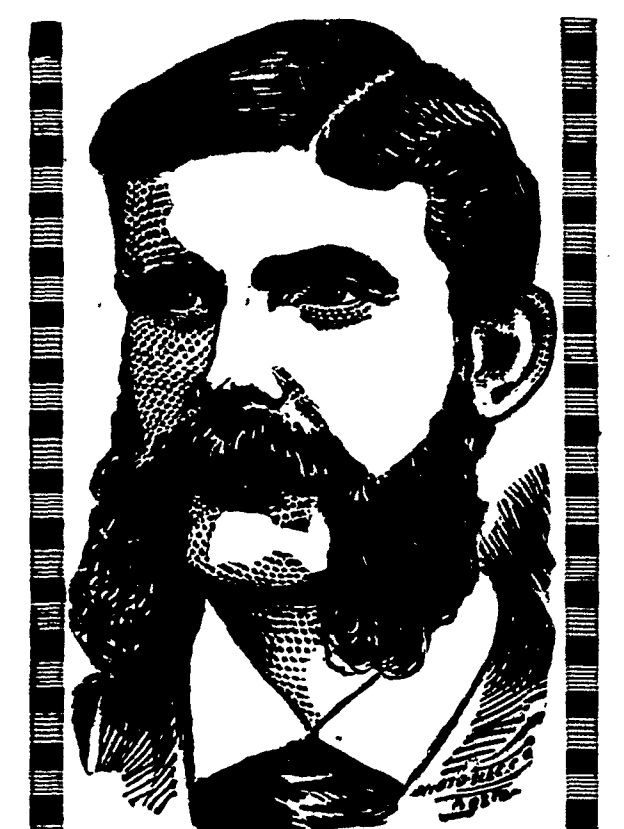
