NEWS OF THE WEEK.

A SUMMARY OF THE WEEK'S IMPORTANT DOINGS.

The News Itself, Clipped, Culled, Condensed and Presented Without Padding or Flowers and with a Special Concern for the Convenience of the Busy Public in General.

A Philadelphia dispatch says: It is learned on good authority that A. A. McLeod and syndicate intend to take up the Boston and Maine and the New York and New England stock now in the treasury of the Reading Railroad company. As this step involves an outlay of a great deal more than \$1,000,000 its importance can not be overestimated.

Governor Flower has assigned Justice Alton B. Parker of Kingston to the bench of the general term of the supreme court of the first department, in place of Justice Willard Bartlett, declined.

John Wetzell of Middletown, N. Y., was thrown from his carriage and probably fatally injured in Lansingburg, where he was visiting relatives. He was 82 years of age.

A Montreal dispatch says: L'Etendard (newspaper) is in financial difficulties and has offered to settle with its creditors on a basis of 10 cents on the dollar. The liabilities are between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

Frederick J. Kaldenberg, dealer in pipes, tobacco, etc., at New York, has assigned to Henry C. Fuller without preferences.

Colonel W. B. Hayes, who was convicted at New York of perjury and sentenced to eight years in state prison, was taken to Sing Sing to begin his term of imprisonment.

At Paris the senatorial election in the department of the drome resulted in the choice of M. Lauren by 478 votes against 280 for his opponent, M. Pavon. Both are Republicans.

Reuben Lukens, Jr., and William E. Lukens, trading in lumber as Lukens & Co., of Philadelphia, have made an assignment for the benefit of creditors. It is said that the liabilities are about \$170,000, which, however, will scale down very materially.

A Christiania dispatch says: The Viking ship, which is to be shown at the World's fair, sailed from this port. She will cruise along the coast in order that the people may have an opportunity to see her, and early in May will sail from Bergen for the United States.

A severe earthquake was felt in many parts of Servia. The village of Veliki Popovitch was tumbled into ruins and several inhabitants were killed. Deaths in wrecked houses are reported from other villages in the kingdom.

A Standhope (N. J.) dispatch says: The Herdington iron mines, located near Lake Hopatcong and operated by the Glendon Iron company, are about to be abandoned. The vein from which the ore is now obtained is about exhausted. The mines give employment to about 300 hands.

A dispatch from Seattle says: Captain John Christianson has made one of the deepest dives on record. He plunged into the waters of Elliot bay and after 20 minutes returned with the lead line and a bucket from one of the hatches of the tug Majestic, lying at a depth at half tide of 196 feet. He apparently suffered no great inconvenience.

Michael Welch, 50 years old, appeared at his mother's house in Boston after having been missing for 20 years and been given up as dead. He had served 17 years in prison in Melbourne, Australia, for complicity in a murder of which he was innocent.

John J. Hand, who for over 20 years has been in the retail drygoods business in Amsterdam, N. Y., has assigned to David Cady. Liabilities are more than \$25,000; assets unknown. Mr. Hand was the oldest drygoods dealer in the Mohawk valley.

An old man fell down a flight of stairs at the railroad station at Johnstown, N. Y., and was killed. There was nothing about him to lead to his identity excepting a letter addressed to W. F. Lunier, St. Johnsville.

A dispatch says that Miss Edith Day returned to Portland over the Southern Pacific, having completed her 10,000-mile railroad journey through the United States and Mexico in 17 days and 14 1/2 hours. Miss Doolittle left Chicago at the same time and traveled in an opposite direction. She traveled the entire distance according to schedule.

Antonucci, a conspicuous Italian aero naut, made an ascension in a balloon at Arezzo, Tuscany. A gust of wind drove the balloon against a tower. Antonucci was thrown out and he fell 150 feet. His skull was shattered.

The house, cattle sheds, farm machinery, etc., belonging to a German farmer named Garlan, living near the Clark county, S. D., line, were destroyed by a prairie fire and others lost grain and hay. Fires are also reported destructive along the east edge of Handy county.

A Valparaiso dispatch says: A telegram has just been received from Santiago which says that an attack was made on the government buildings by a mob. The mob was driven away, but in consequence of the disorders martial law is reported to have been declared in the provinces of Antofagasta, Valparaiso and Aconcagua.

At Gloversville, N. Y., R. D. Meredith, well known in this section died after being ill one day. His friends claim that his death was due to apoplexy but others say it was due to an overdose of morphine taken by him while suffering from melancholia. The affair has created considerable talk here.

The news of the marriage of George E. Tilford, a son of Charles E. Tilford, of the well-known grocery house of Park & Tilford, to Rita Selby, an actress of the "Trip to China town" company, has become generally known in this city, the ceremony having been performed quietly in Elizabeth, N. J., on March 2, though opposed by the parents of the bridegroom.

The corner stone of the new building of St. John's parochial school at Orange, N. J., was laid by the Right Rev. W. M. Wigger, bishop of the diocese of Newark. A large number of distinguished clergymen took part in the ceremony and it was witnessed by a crowd of spectators estimated at from 8,000 to 8,000.


The British bark Arthurstone, from San Francisco Oct. 20, which arrived at Queens town, reports that Jan. 10 she was in collision with an iceberg 500 miles off the Falkland Islands. During the excitement several of the crew launched boats, but were persuaded to return by the captain and to rig jury masts. The Arthurstone lost her foretopmast and bowsprit and damaged her bows.

United States Marshal Matthews received notice that Whiteface Horse, the Sioux chief who accompanied Four Strike in his raid on Humphrey's ranch, in which four cowboys were killed, committed suicide at a camp on White river, by shooting himself through the head.

REDRESS DEMANDED.

Turkey Will be Called to a Strict Account.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—It is stated that the United States has taken vigorous action in regard to the outrages of American citizens at Marsovan in the Turkish dominions and the violation of the mail of the United States legation. The fact of the case are as follows: On Jan. 10 last a number of seditious placards were distributed throughout the region of Marsovan.



On account of alleged seditious movements existing among the Armenians the Turkish authorities ascribed the authorship of these placards to the students of Anatolia college, an American educational institution, at Marsovan. On the night of Feb. 21st the girls' seminary of the institution was fired and burned to the ground.

There was strong circumstantial evidence to show that this was done with the full knowledge if not by the direct act of the Turkish officials. The conditions of the Americans in that place became so critical that the United States consul, Milo A. Jewett, was dispatched thither from Sivas, at the American legation in that district have been under his protection ever since. Dispatches passing between Minister Thompson and Consul Jewett at Marsovan have been repeatedly violated, and formal complaint of this fact has been made by the American minister to the sublime porte.

Further Restrictions on Chief Arthur.

CLEVELAND, April 8.—P. M. Arthur, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, was served with another restraining order issued by Judge Taft. It enjoins him from issuing any boycotting order against the Toledo, Ann Arbor and Northern Michigan railway and from inducing employees of connecting lines to discriminate against that line in any manner pending further action in the United States court.



Ministers in the Deathchair.
SING SING, N. Y., April 12.—A delegation of 25 ministers from the New York Methodist Episcopal conference at Tarrytown were the guests of Warden Brown and were shown through the prison. The electrical chair was brought out from its cover and the ministers were allowed to sit in it. They were not allowed to visit the deathhouse where Harris and the six other murderers are confined.

Italian Man-of-War at Portland.
PORTLAND, Me., April 12.—The Italian man-of-war Eridano has reached this port. Alderman Quittill read an address of welcome and formally extended the freedom of the city to the Italian visitors. Captain Riccoli replied in Italian.
