HOLY FAMILY.

At a meeting of the Y. M. C. C. it was unanimously decided to allow members of other parishes between the age of 18 and 45 to become honorary members under the following rule:

Initiation fee, \$5. Said members not to have any vote at meetings or hold office, but shall have all other privileges of the club.

Dues of the Honorary members to be the same as active members.

A PROTEST FROM ROCHESTER BRANCHES.

At a regular meeting of Rochester Central Council of the C. M. B. A., held April 6, 1893, it was resolved to protest against the action of the Grand Board of Trustees in appointing a paid organizer. It was also resolved to publish the protest and send a copy of the same to the Supreme and Grand Officers.

We protest against the injustice of using the general fund of the Council in such a manner without consulting the members who have contributed to that fund; and we hold that before action was taken the matter should have been brought before the Branches of the State for consideration.

We protest against the appointment as being illegal and extravagant, doing violence to the traditions of our association, and constituting a breach of faith on the part of the organization toward a large number of members.

We believe it is the business of the Supreme Council alone to employ paid organizers, if they must be employed, since a gain of membership in one State benefits the members in all Grand Councils as well as those under the immediate jurisdiction of the Supreme Council.

Rochester Central Council is composed of representation of the fourteen Branches in this city. The protesting resolution was passed by a vote of sixteen to five.
