The weather permitting, the programme for Sunday July 2 will be as follows: Admission will be by ticket only and the price has been fixed at 50c. each. At 9:30 a. m., the Knights of SS. Peter and Paul, St. Peter's, St. Paul's and St. Francis societies and the Y. M. C. A. will proceed from the school, with band, to the Bishop's residence and there receive the Bishop and the visitors and escort them to the pastor's residence. The procession of the clergy will then enter the church through the main entrance, after which the societies, with the exception of the Knights—who have been invited to assist in the ceremonies—will be dismissed. High Mass will begin at 10 a. m., the Most Rev. Michael Augustine Corrigan, Archbishop of New York, pontificating, assisted by Fathers Allman, Rauber, Hagar, Bialer and Miller, all children

of the parish. Rt. Rev. Bishop Richter, of Grand Rapids diocese, and Rt. Rev. Bishop Wigger, of Newark, N. J., will be present. Rev. Father Weirich, of St. Joseph's church, will preach the sermon.
