TOLD BY MARINES.

Many deep sea fishes are covered with phosphorescent spots, which act as portable lamps. These fish live at a depth of two to five miles. Their soft bodies are made firm by the tremendous pressure of the surrounding water.

In the course of a trial to determine the ownership of a bushel of oysters, a Cape May oysterman testified that he could identify his own oysters wherever found. The jury didn't agree with him, but he says he will appeal the case.

The wreck of a gunboat which was sunk during the late war and which lies in the regular channel near the Cape Fear bar, in North Carolina, will soon be removed. This obstruction has been a source of annoyance and danger to all deep-draught vessels, and when removed the depth on the bar can be largely increased.

A curious phenomenon may be witnessed in the Straits of Gibraltar. Two currents flow through the narrow opening. The upper one, which is the warmer and slower of the two, carries the water from the Mediterranean sea into the Atlantic, and the under current brings back sufficient water to preserve the level of the two seas.

The fact that the slave trade once extended far north on this continent is written upon the map in the name Labrador. This name was given to the inhospitable coast of the far Northeast by early Portuguese navigators, who were much impressed with the strength and endurance of the laborers whom they kidnapped there and carried into slavery.

A. D. Dumas, an old St. Louis steamboat man, says the narrowest and deepest place in the Mississippi river is at a point just below Richardson's landing, about 200 miles south of St. Louis. It is called the "devil's hole," named so by the negroes long before the war. The banks on either side are of solid rock and stand up almost perpendicular. Soundings have been made there to the depth of 200 feet and the bottom never reached.

The English skylark has often been introduced into New England, but all attempts to domesticate it have proved futile, for the climate is too severe.

At Uniontown, Pa., the jury in the case of Robert Hughes, who sued the Baltimore and Ohio railway company for \$25,000 damages for a leg lost in a wreck two years ago, found for the plaintiff in the sum of \$2,832.

They are experimenting with an electric cab in Berlin by having it run races with the ordinary horse cabs. The reports to date seem to show the superiority of the vehicle propelled by electricity. A distance of six English miles was covered in twenty minutes, or at the rate of about three minutes a mile, by it.

A short time ago, on board a train of cars, a man was very much engaged in trying to prove that all men are growing wiser, when a half-drunk fellow staggered up to him, saying: "Mr. —, what a big fool your grandfather must have been!" At once changed the subject, while the car was filled with shams.

Several men who have outlived their greatness are now glad to earn their living as coachmen in Berlin. Among them are sixteen nobles, seven retired army officers and three pulpitiess pastors.
