### ST. BRIDGET'S.

The following was received too late for last issue:

Sister Helena, who has taught in St. Bridget's school since its organization eighteen years ago, and who has been principle of the school for the past six years, has been removed to Dansville, being made mother-superior of the convent there.

Sister Helena came to St. Bridget's when the school was in its infancy. She has watched it grow and was the means of making it what it is to-day, one of the first in the diocese. She was not only an excellent teacher, but also a fine vocalist, and greatly interested herself in the music of the church, being director of the choir for a long time.

Besides her secular duties she always found time to visit the sick, and when death entered any of our families, Sister Helena was always first to offer consolation.

She has been with us so long and has done so much for us, that we feel our loss in her removal is very great. We are glad to hear of her promotion, however, and while we will miss her pleasant face from among us, she can rest assured that the best wishes of the many friends in St. Bridget's will accompany her to her new field of labor.

### HOLY FAMILY.

On the second Sunday of October a two weeks mission will be opened by Redemptorist Fathers from Baltimore. Special prayers were said after High Mass and at Vespers for the success of the mission and for the conversion of sinners, for even every family has its share of these.

Father Lauerenzis, the pastor, was able to announce to the congregation, that the entire church property is free from debt. Besides the church, the property consists of two large school buildings, a magnificent convent for the Sisters, and a large, commodious residence for the priests. One school, convent and priests residence were built within the last five years.

We find that on one of the reserve fund mortgages the interest is in default, but we are informed by the Grand Secretaries that said mortgage has been ordered foreclosed, and the same is now in process of adjustment.

We received the annual report from 161 branches, showing the amount of money forwarded to the Grand Secretary for the year ending July 1, '93, 132 of said reports proved correct and 29 had to be sent back as erroneous.

Thirteen branches failed to report (branches named.)

In submitting this our annual report, we desire that such portion of same as you deem for the best interests of our Association be officially published.

Finance Committee.

The foregoing report was received and ordered spread upon the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Trustees held in Rochester Aug. 17, but through unintentional omission it was not ordered published.

At the same meeting on motion the Grand Secretary was instructed to charge up the constitutional fine of \$10. against each branch, reported by the finance committee as not having made to said committee the report required by law, and notify each branch liable to said fine, of this action, and to pay said fine within the time prescribed by law.

These instructions were carried out by me, and five of the branches have paid the fine. Others have written and given various reasons for their failure to forward the report and asking that they may be excused and the fine remitted. These letters were read to the board at its meeting held at Buffalo the 13 inst.,

and after careful consideration of the same, and the law bearing upon the subject, the board decided that while it would in one or two cases, be pleased for the reasons offered, to remit the fine, it has no power to do so, as the law is mandatory, and gives the board no authority to set it aside.

The law provides in Sec 77, that "the branches failing to report shall be fined."

The Grand Secretary was therefore instructed to inform all of said branches of this decision, and that said fine must be promptly paid, or the defaulting branches be reported to the Grand President for suspension in accordance with said section 77.

I have this day complied with the above direction of the board and expect the fine to be paid during the present week with assessment No. 12.

#### AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

The committee on laws and their supervision of the Supreme council have just handed down an important legal decision on the signification of Section 10 of the beneficiary fund law of the association in relation to reinstating members who have been suspended for non-payment of assessments. This is the substance of the decision:

"We are of the unanimous opinion that an assessment is due from the date that is issued from the branch's financial secretary, as under the legal definitions which we have quoted, there is no doubt that an assessment is due from the date that it is issued and came into existence. We have determined the legal signification of that part of said Section 10 relating to reinstatement of members who have become suspended for non-payment of assessments, to be, That a member suspended for non-payment of beneficiary and remaining suspended during the period of three months or less, is not entitled to reinstatement until he pays the assessment or assessments due and payable at the time of his suspension, and all assessments issued by the proper officer of his branch from the date of his suspension to the date of his reinstatement. The other condition as to the majority vote to be also fulfilled."

#### Robinson's Musce Theatre

Daly and Clark will not appear at the matinees, but will give an exhibition at each of the evening performances.
