## THE NEWS IN BRIEF.

### POINTED ITEMS CHRONICLING THE WEEK'S HAPPENINGS.

The Record of Crimes, Accidents, and Other Matters of General Interest to the Public at Large, Given in Few Words for the Benefit of Those Who Are in a Hurry.

Captain Andrew C. Bayne, vice president of the Atma Fire Insurance company of Hartford, Conn., died near Newport, R. I., Oct. 14.

Poison was placed in the well of a farmer, living near Jericho Springs, Mo., and his family and two guests were poisoned. The mother died in a few hours and no hopes are entertained for three of the children and the two guests.

At Sioux City, La., four blocks comprising the city buildings, were destroyed by fire. Loss, \$600,000.

Frederick Dorr, aged 30, committed suicide on Van Ronkern's Island, below Albany, by shooting.

James B. Mackey, who on Aug. 23 walked into the Cincinnati Builders' exchange and stole a package from the safe containing \$1,700, has been sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary.

Mrs. Elmer Hageman of Lambertville, N. J., had some teeth extracted some time ago and the operation so upset her that she has become insane. She jumped out of a 2-story window and received severe injuries.

The interior department has appointed G. C. Crager, who acquired some fame during the outbreak of the Sioux City fire, as special agent of Indian lands for the Sioux nation.

The infant *Eualla* of Spain, who recently visited the United States, is now visiting incognito in London. Her husband, Prince Antoine d'Orleans accompanied her.

Hon. Charles A. Dana lectured at Schenectady, N. Y., before the students in Union college on "Journalism and the Press."

The effort to oust Receiver Failey of the Iron Hall has failed. The report of the receiver was approved and exactions made to overrule.

At Buffalo the hinge of a sprout on the Wilkerson elevator broke, and the sprout, a wrought iron casting, weighing nearly a ton, fell on the dock, striking Michael Fenlon, a seaman, and crushed him to death instantly.

At Hornellsville, N. Y., a young man named James Brown was found lying dead in a pool of blood. It is supposed he was murdered, but there is no positive cause.

The Crown Princess of Roumania, formerly the Princess Marie of Edinburgh, has given birth to a son.

At Brownsville, Tenn., fire was discovered in Rive's grocery, and before the flames could be checked six 3-story brick business houses and a large frame livery stable had been destroyed.

At New York Dr. Augustus Trebitsch, a Russian physician, died from a case of carbolic acid, whether taken by accident or not unknown. He was a graduate of Albany medical college and a veteran of the Civil war.

John L. Thomas, ex-Congressman, and formerly ex-collector of the port of Baltimore, died at his residence in that city of heart failure.

Colonel W. H. H. Taylor, state librarian since 1877, is dying at his home in St. Paul, Minn. He was born in Richmond, Va., Nov. 28, 1812.

At New York John Riordan, 14 years old, fell from a 4-story window in an epileptic fit, and was impaled upon an iron fence below. He died shortly afterward at the Harlem hospital.

Annie and Maggie Tracey, two old maid sisters, who were severely burned at New York through the upsetting of a kerosene lamp, have died of their injuries.

Anthony Burke, a wealthy citizen of Albion, N. Y., was killed in Chicago by a trolley car.

At Corning, N. Y., the ivy stables of Lewis Green were burned. Eight horses perished in the flames. Loss, \$4,000.

At Minneapolis V. T. Tyler shot his wife, Emma F. Tyler, and then put a bullet in his own head. The woman will recover but the man will die.

Louis Dinamarco, the inventor of a writer and other mechanical contrivances, died at New York from cancer of the face. He was born at Hoboken 60 years ago.

At Houston, Tex., the Union block, in which were located lodges of the Knights of Pythias, Oddfellows, and a number of stores, was burned. Loss, \$50,000; insurance, one half.

The fire which occurred at the Baltimore city jail last Friday night has so far resulted in the death of three colored men.

Charles Francois Gounod, the composer of the opera "Faust," was stricken with pleurosy and died at his house in St. Cloud, a suburb of Paris.

The Local Anzeiger of Berlin says the countess has been formally betrothed to Prince Victoria, the second daughter of the Prince of Wales.

The works of the Wagon-Lite company at St. Denis, France, were burned. Loss, \$3,000,000 francs.

At the trotting races at Nashville, Tenn., in the yearling dash Princess Clara made a new world's record of 2:04, 1/2 1/2 seconds off the record made by Bell-Bird, at Stockton, Calif., in 1891.

Judge Marlow in the court of general sessions in New York sentenced Emma Goldman, the anarchist, to a year's imprisonment in the penitentiary.
