A New Light on the State of Affairs on the Islands - Provisional Government Was Not Established by a Revelution of the Natives. The Royalists Feared United States Perces.

Washington, Nov. 11.-A letter of Sec retary Greeham to the president, dated the 18th, concerning Hawalian affairs, has been given out for publication. in it he takes the ground that the marines landed from the United States steamer Boston at the time of the revolution, were not landed to protect American life and property but to aid in overthrowing the existing government. Their very presence, he said, implies coercive measures against it. The provisional government was catablished by the action of the American minister and the presence of the troops landed from the Boston and its continued existence is due to the belief of the Hawailans that if they made an effort to overthrow it, they would encounter the armed forces of the United States. The letter concludes as follows:

The carnest appeals to the American ministax for military protection by the officers of the provisional government, for it has been recognized, show the utter absurdity of the claim that it was catablished by a successful-revolution of the people of the islands. These appeals were a confession by the men who made them of their weakness and timidity. Courageous men, conscious of their atrength and the justice of their cause, do not thus act, It is now claimed that a majority of the peo-

have not the right to vote under the conetitution of 1887, or ever favored the existing authority, or annexation to this or any other country. They carnestly desire that the government of their choice shall be restored and its independence respected.

Mr. Blount states that while at Honolulu he

did not meet a single annexationist who expressed willingness to submit the question to a rate of the people, nor did he talk with one on that subject who did not insist that if the latands were annexed, suffrage should be so restricted as to give complete control to foreign ers or whites, and representative annexationis to have repeatedly made similar statements to the understaned.

The government of Hawall surrendered its authority under a threat of war, until such time only as the government of the United. States, upon the fact being presented to it. should reinstate the constitutional sovereign and the provisional government was allowed to exist until the terms of union with the United States of America had been negotiated and agreed upon.

A careful consideration of the facts will, I

think convince you that the treaty which was withdrawn from the senate for further consideration should not be resulmitted for action

Should not the great wrong done to a feeble, but independent state by an abuse of the authority of the United States be undone by restoring the legitimate sovernment? Anything short of that, will not, I respectfully submit, satisfy the demands of justice.

Can the United States consistently insist that other nations chall respect the independence of Hawall while not respecting it themselves. Our government was the first to recognize the independence of the islands and should be the last to acquire sovereignity over them by force and fraud. Respectfully submitted,

Secretary of State. WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Unless he has met with some delay, United States Minlster Willis has now been in Honolulu a week, and it is not improbable that he has carried into effect the instructions he took with him and which have been so well

kept a secret on this side of the Pacific. If he has done so, the steamer which left Honolulu Saturday will bring the news of the consequent events and will reach an outlet to the rest of the world with it on

next Saturday. Whatever recourse the administration may have determined upon to secure the restoration of Queen Lilipokalani, it is very evident that Secretary Gresham does not expect that extreme measures will

have to be resorted to. The course proposed to be pursued seems to be to request the present government in the name of the United States to give way quietly to the restoration of the queen.

The Hawaiians in this city are very firm in their conviction that the government will refuse to yield to any such gentle-persuasion as that They assert their carnest belief that it will require at least a show of force to induce them to resign the reins of authority.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 - The plan of the Hawalian representatives evidently is to stand tigitly on the rights they have acquired by the recognition of their govern-

ment.
Minister Thurston touched the marrow of their hopes when he said in Chicago that any attemp to overthrow the present government by a foreign power would be an act of war.

An act of war requires the consent or declaration of congress. Congress will undoubtedly take up the subject of Hawaii in some way immediately upon assembling in December. The fight, it is said, will be made on the administration policy on this line, that it has declared war without the consent of congress and has therein done an unlawful act.

RIO AGAIN SHELLED.

Insurgents Open Fire on Fort. Ville gaigues. LONDON, Nov. 14.-The Times has received the following advices from Rio

Janeiro; There was heavy firing on Sunday and Monday last week by the government forts m Fort Villegaignon. The outside walls of the latter fort show much damage.

Two men were killed and seven wounded. The troops at Castello opened a musketry fire at Fort Villegaignon from a distance of 1.200 vards.

The insurgent warship Aquidaban replied with machine guns, killing or wounding 30 soldiers and four spectators.

The firing continues day and night. There are continual skirmishes at Nic-

theroy between the government troops and the insurgent small craft. A torpedo launch was sunk on Wednesday. The gasometer at Lorenzo had been

destroyed. A conference between the insurgent leaders resulted in a decision to shortly

hoist the imperial flag. This decision greated a good impression. Admiral Sa'danhe de Gama, the chief of the naval college and the ablest admi-

ral in Brazil, hitherto neutral, has now openly joined the insurgents and has taken command of the operations before Hio Janeiro:





The fence wires are locked to the post by staples inserted in holes provided for this purpose, board stretchers being similarly featened by clinch or wire nails. With this improvement the post is designed to be so anchored to the ground that it will not be upheaved by the frost, and, on any disturbance of one earth. It will slide back as the ground artitles.
