BROTHER ANTHONY'S CALL.

A Former Resident of Rochester to Go to France.

Brother Anthony, who was born in this city and whose early life here won him many friends, has resigned the presidency of the Manhattan College, having been called to the headquarters of the Brothers of the Christian Schools in Paris and promoted to the staff of the superior general of the order.

During his incumbency as president of Manhattan College he took rank among the prominent Roman Catholic educational institutions of the country. In 1889 Brother Anthony founded the De La Salle Institute in Fifty-ninth street, opposite Central Park, New York.
