GLORIFYING IN ITS SHAME.

The *Jewish Tidings* makes the following comment on our criticism of its action in styling the insulting epistle of Bishop Coxe to Archbishop Satolli a "splendid letter."

We repeat what we said a few weeks ago. The letter was a splendid one. Mgr. Satolli is making an attempt to unite Church and State, and deserved just such treatment as Bishop Coxe gave him.

Our beloved and esteemed bishop has passed forever from our earthly view. His death on last Tuesday awakened universal sorrow in this city and throughout the diocese he had governed during the past twenty-one years with so much zeal and ability.

So it is in the case of Mgr. Satolli. It is the height of impudence for Protestant, Jew or Infidel to give him advice in matters which affect his Church alone, and shows wretched taste and exceedingly bad judgment for any journal to approve of such criticism.

Our contemporary should learn a lesson from the courtesy shown by American Gentiles to the Jewish representative; it should endeavor to acquire better manners.

The assertion that Archbishop Satolli has attempted to unite State and Church, has no foundation in fact. The Papal delegate has made no such attempt and we invite the *Tidings* to prove that he has made any move in that direction.

SOME ADVICE REGARDING SOCIETIES.

A communication was sent to us from Ovid, N. Y., inquiring if the A. O. U. W. is under the ban of the Church. Many Catholics are members of the A. O. U. W., and remain so, we believe, with the consent of their spiritual adviser, but we advise Catholics to keep out of it for three reasons, which we will state for the benefit of our correspondent.

1st. The whole question of secret societies was at a meeting of the Archbishops of the United States about two years ago, referred to a committee of several archbishops. The object of this step was to lead to a uniform method of dealing with such associations and prevent the condemning of certain societies in one diocese while Catholics were permitted to join them in the next.

2d. It is unnecessary and inexcusable for a Catholic to join non-Catholic organizations while we have such good fraternal insurance associations within the Church as the C. M. B. A., O. B. L., and O. R. and B. A. If none of these has a Branch within your parish, it is all the more reason why you should go around among your Catholic neighbors and induce them to assist you in establishing one.

3d. The A. O. U. W. is not as good an organization from a business standpoint as the C. M. B. A. The records of the State Insurance Department show the latter stands at the head of all the mutual insurance associations doing business in the State of New York.
