ST. MICHAEL'S

The Knights of St. George intend to give one of their popular entertainments some time next month.

The members of St. Leo Society performed their Easter duty at 8 o'clock last Sunday. High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Pascalar.

Bernard Stoecker died Thursday night of last week at his residence, 959 North Clinton street, after a short but painful illness, aged 53 years. The deceased was a most sincere Christian, beloved and highly esteemed by all, especially his now sorrowing family. Mr. Stoecker was a member of St. Leo Society and Branch 84, O. M. B. A., in which latter organization he held the office of trustee. For more than twenty-three years the deceased was a trusted employee of Wm. B. Morse & Co., lumber dealers. The funeral took place at 9 o'clock Monday attended by St. Leo Society in a body and a delegation of Branch 84. The members of the firm, whom he served so long and faithfully, as well as all of his fellow-workers, attended. The church was filled by friends and acquaintances of the deceased. Requiem Mass was celebrated by Father Begeboegen. Mr. Stoecker leaves besides his wife, six children, three sons and three daughters. Two sisters are members of the order of Notre Dame.

Coming here when the congregation was struggling under the debt of its first church, his foresight in the temporal welfare, soon discovered the necessary improvements in a growing congregation, inspired that good will of the people of St. Boniface, who assisted him in bringing the parish to its present state of prosperity, giving the congregation and community a proof of the zeal, spirit and devotion to the cause of Christianity. In looking over the work accomplished, we realize the loss the congregation has suffered in his being taken from us at a time when he would have been able to enjoy the fruits that crowned his efforts with this people, who send their prayers to Him who will reward all who have labored in His cause, as has our departed friend and pastor.

FATHER RENKER.

HIS DEATH AT 11 A. M. TUESDAY - HIS CAREER.

Father Renker was born in Germany in 1835. He was ordained a priest in 1861. In July, 1875, he came to America, having been obliged to leave Germany on account of the Kulturkampf. He belonged before that time to the diocese of Munster, Westphalia. He was also for several years a professor at Rhine. Immediately upon coming to this country he was called to the pastorate of St. Boniface's Church of this city, which he assumed in September, 1876.

Over this large congregation Father Renker presided without an assistant for eighteen years, celebrating two Masses each Sunday, singing vespers and looking after his Sunday School. With all this hard work he found time to attend all the ceremonies and celebrations at the Cathedral and on the occasion of Mgr. De Regge's silver jubilee it was remarked that it seemed strange not to see Father Renker there.

Father Renker was taken ill last fall of a malady which had troubled him at times, inflammatory rheumatism. It soon appeared that his heart was affected. Rev. John Boppel was sent to assist him in the parochial work and it was hoped that rest would restore his health. But he failed rapidly and for the last few days his death had been expected at almost any moment.

The remains of Father Renker were placed in the church from Thursday, at 9:00 a. m., until the time of the funeral, at 9:00 a. m. Friday, April 20th. St. Boniface Catholic Union, St. Boniface Society, St. Josephs, and St. Herman's attended in a body.

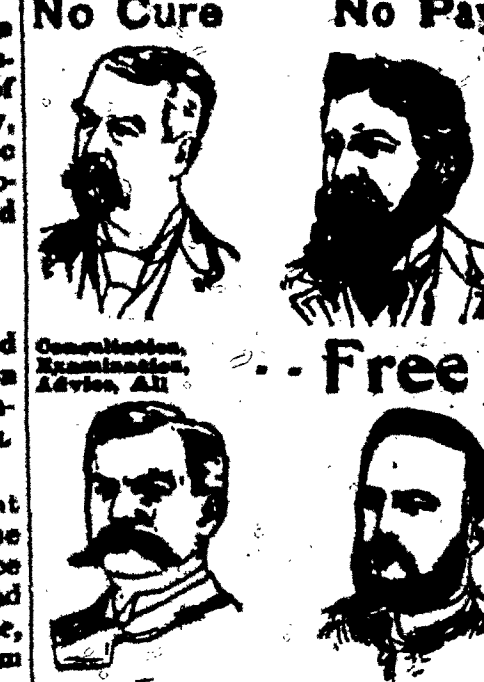
