OUR BISHOP'S WORK.

ORDINATIONS, CONFIRMATIONS, ETC., IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

On the 16th of May our Rt. Rev. Bishop will confer minor orders in deaconship on a number of students in St. Bernard's Seminary.

On the 17th inst. the Bishop will raise to the priesthood Rev. Owen Farron and Rev. Mr. Hughes, both of whom were recently made deacons. The ceremony will take place in the Cathedral at 9 a. m.

On Sunday, May 27th at 4 p. m. Confirmation will be given to a large class at the Cathedral.

Bishop McQuaid will be in New York on May 30th, on which date will take place the consecration of the Church of St. Gabriel. Monsignor Satolli, Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia, and Archbishop Corrigan will assist in the services. In the evening Bishop McQuaid will preach.

On the first Sunday in June Confirmation will be given at Geneva. The following Sunday the Bishop will confirm a class at St. Mary's church, this city.

On June 14th our Rt. Rev. Bishop will attend the commencement exercises of Seton Hall College, in New Jersey, of which Bishop McQuaid is the founder and of which he is still one of the trustees.

On June the 17th Confirmation will be given in Corpus Christi church, this city.

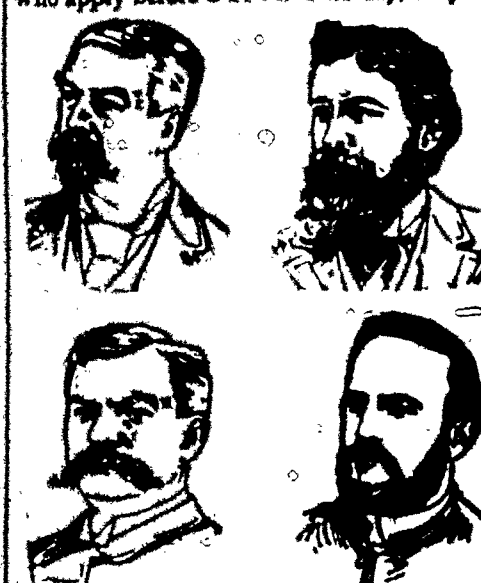
