## FIRE'S AWFUL WORK

HUNDREDS OF FAMILIES ARE LEFT HOMELESS.

Over a Hundred Dwellings Destroyed In Boston Several Persons Lojured and Two Beported Missing -- Loss Est. mated at Fully a Million\_The Work of an lecendiary

ton, planned and flatshed by patriotic BOSTON. May 16. -By the torch of an incendiary over \$1,000,000 worth of property is in ashes, over 500 families of the mediam and poorer clusses consisting of over 2,000 people, are homeless and many of them who had time to save a portion of their household furniture slept in the open air, guarding all that they have in world on Madison park and on ope a town lots literally piled six feet high with furuiture of every description.

Women, with babies in their arms and little children huddled close together, had only the sky for a roof and the few mattresses saved from the burned tenements for a bed and no prospects of a breakfast

After 6 o'clock, the time for the workshops and business places to close, many pathetic scenes were witnessed.

Fathers returning to find their bomes barned to the ground and no trace of their wives and little ones children, who had been at work as each boys and girls in people who filed through a lane formed the big drygoods and other stores, barred by the Hichmond Blues drawn up to out from the streets where they resided, unable to find traces of their parents. The St. Vincent society is doing good

work in collecting the children and women and giving them shelter in the school returning various bomes.

The drug stores in the neighborhood were used an hospitals for the large number of firemen who were overcome by the donse smoke and were suffering from ourns caused by the flying embers. The salcons to and around the burned district were closed by order of the police.

A walk around the burned district after the conflagration was over showed the vast territory which the firefiend had traversed.
