HOLY REDEEMER.

Rev. J. F. Staub, assistant priest of the church of the most Holy Redeemer is appointed by the Bishop to take charge of the congregations of St. John's, Greece and Holy Ghosts Cold Water, heretofore pastorized by Rev. H. Straten, now rector of St. Mary's church, of Danville. Rev. Rector Oberholzer as well as the congregation regrets the departure of such an exemplary priest. Rev. F. Oberholzer, because he was for five years a true friend and a zealous co-operator in the vineyard of the Lord and the congregation, because he was a good counsellor to every needy one in the congregation.

The school children especially will miss him. He always was and has been the best friend of the youth and a spiritual father to them in the full sense of the word.

The vacancy will be filled by Rev. J. Miller until now assistant priest of Holy Family church. As he is not unknown to the congregation and as he made a very favorable impression, while he has delivered some beautiful lenten sermons in their church, he will be cordially welcomed by the congregation of Rev. Rector Oberholzer, of whom the new assistant was always an intimate friend.

ST. MICHAEL'S.

Sunday evening a May procession was held from the church, through extensive grounds of the garden connected with the church and convent several thousand people, men, women and children, of all classes, took part in this beautiful and edifying devotion in honor of the Heavenly Queen of the Month of Mary.

After High Mass on Sunday a business meeting of the congregation was held, in which several resolutions were adopted for the better collection of pew rent and school money. It is hoped that through the new arrangement delays in the payment of money due for pew rent and tuition will be better avoided and the finances of the church will be placed in better condition.

Flower City Council 305, C. B. L. received Holy Communion last Sunday in a body. This Council is composed of 15 members and is in a flourishing condition.

CORPUS CHRISTI.

At the 10:30 Mass Sunday, May 13th, at Corpus Christi church, the services of the Forty Hours were opened. Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Leary. The procession headed by the altar boys, followed by 14 little girls, marched in front of Father Leary who carried the Blessed Sacrament down the center aisle and back to the altar where the Blessed Sacrament was placed for adoration.

During the Mass the choir was assisted by the Vogt Orchestra, and Miss Anna Connolly presided at the organ, rendering very fine music. In the evening Vespers was celebrated by Rev. Father Meahan, of the seminary, who also delivered a fine sermon on "Man's Duty to God and the Sacrifice we should make to Him." The Altar Boys chanted Hymns during the service in a very good manner.

The Monday evening service was celebrated by Rev. Father Gleason, of the Immaculate Conception, and after the recitation of the beads he addressed the congregation on the Sacrament of Penance, and spoke of the value of this great Sacrament to mankind. The speaker dwelt at length on contrition and how hard we should work to excite a hearty sorrow and true contrition for our sins, and now was the accepted time at this holy time of the closing of Easter season and also the Forty Hours.

Large crowds filled the church at each service and the Forty Hours closed Wednesday at 9 o'clock in a highly pleasing manner.

BRIEF LOCAL NOTES.

We regret to learn of a serious accident which occurred to Lawrence Oberlies of South Clinton street this week. While working with a planer he lost three fingers.

The Rochester Railway Company has placed an order for street car guards with the Crawford Company of Allegheny City, Pa.

Three of the L. O. B. A. Branches of this city have decided to form a central board and have adopted a constitution.

At Monday night's meeting of the Executive Committee of the Monroe County Veteran Brigade, Capt. Henry Lomb made the important announcement that Bishop McQuaid has donated to be used as a burial place for soldiers and sailors of the Civil War, a lot at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery 62 by 50 feet in dimensions. Captain Lomb said:

We had a conference with the Bishop, and he told us that he was willing to give us a soldier's lot anywhere on the west side of the grounds. He said that he was sorry that we had not spoken to him before, as he wished us to have as good a place as there is in the cemetery. We were told to select any site on the west side and we chose the north corner lot next the road. The lot is in a good location, and it will not cost us one cent. We hope this will lead to there being in time but two cemeteries in the city in which soldiers are buried.

The veterans present expressed themselves as greatly pleased and gratified at the patriotic and generous action of Bishop McQuaid in giving the new lot to the Brigade as a final resting place for soldiers who had bravely risked their lives in defending their country in its hour of peril.

A retreat for the young ladies of the French church is in progress this week and will close Sunday morning. Rev. Wm. Harrington, Rev. J. G. Van Ness and other priests preached during the week.
