CONFIRMATION.

The Sacrament of Confirmation was administered to a class of 138 boys and girls in St. Mary's church at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Before giving Confirmation Bishop McQuaid explained to the children the necessity of thorough preparation and said that the occasion marked an epoch in their lives which was of great importance to them. After confirmation he spoke at some length on the solemnity of the occasion.

"At baptism," he said, "you become children of God, but at confirmation you become soldiers of Jesus Christ. It therefore behooves you to conduct yourselves in a manner befitting a brave, faithful soldier. Be honorable and follow the example of those who have won honor and glory by fighting for the Lord. Be not ashamed of your religion and when you grow up do not deny your religion for the friendship of those influential people who are non-Catholics."

"The man who will sacrifice his religion for any purpose on earth is not worthy the name of Catholic. We daily hear of people travelling about the country lying about the Catholic religion. They do not tell us what their own religion is, but continue the old, old story of lies and calumny about the Catholic Church. The tirades of such people have no other effect than to make Catholics more steadfast in their religion."

"There is one thing in particular that I wish to warn the boys against and that is intemperance. The evils of this curse are too obvious to require any comment from me. To acquire this habit is not difficult in a city like Rochester. Here we have saloons at every turn; their doors never close; Sunday or Monday it is all the same. Should the front door be closed an entrance can be effected at the rear. We have good laws in the city; strict laws in every respect, but we never dream of enforcing them. Statistics show that in nine cases out of ten where a young man abstains from the use of intoxicants until he is 21 years of age he will be a sober man. Now I want all of you who will promise to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquor until you are 21 years of age to rise and hold up your right hands."

Instantly the entire class arose and 138 hands were raised.

Bishop McQuaid then recited the pledge and the children repeated it after him.
