## PARIS IN MOURNING.

### REMAINS OF M. CARNOT LAID IN THE PANTHEON.

The Funeral Ceremony Conducted With Great Pomp and Splendor—Thousands Massed Along the Line of March. Solemn and Beautiful Ceremonies at Church and Tomb.

**PARIS, July 2.—The remains of the late President Sadi Carnot, the murdered chief magistrate of France, struck down by the hand of Cesario Santo, the anarchist, at Lyons, on Sunday last, were deposited in the Pantheon by the side of his grandfather, Lazare Carnot, the organizer of victory."**

The funeral was made the occasion for one of the most remarkable civic and military displays in the history of France.

Such was the anxiety of the masses to be present along the line of route to be

followed by the procession that crowds of people began to gather along the Champs Elysees, the Rue de Rivoli and about the streets on the Ile de la Cite, upon which Notre Dame stands, from early Saturday evening.

And at the positions which they had selected, the people camped all night, quiet and mournful, discussing the tragedy and cursing the assassin.

By 6 o'clock in the morning the streets along the route were already crowded, and by 8 o'clock the Place de la Concorde, situated between the Champs Elysees and the Jardin des Tuilleries, was black with people.

At exactly 10:25 a.m. the procession began its march toward the cathedral of Notre Dame. A squadron of Republican guards emerged from the grounds of the palace and proceeded slowly down the Avenue Marigny toward the Avenue Gabriel and the Champs Elysees, the band of the guards playing a funeral march. All the troops presented arms and the people uncovered their heads in the majority of cases in spite of the blinding sun which was beating down upon the pavements.

The casket was covered with the tricolor of France and was heavily draped with crepe. There were no flowers on the funeral car.

At the Pantheon the casket was removed amid a trumpet salute and the dull roll of drums.

The entire procession had not reached the Pantheon before the funeral orations were commenced.

Premier Dupuy during the course of his remarks said: "President Carnot gave his life for his country. He died for France and for the republic. He was struck down in a cowardly manner and with savage vindictiveness. The people concerned in this outrage must be reduced to powerlessness."

Carnot fell like a soldier on the field of honor. At the present moment he already could see before him the hour of repose, for he had not the slightest idea of seeking re-election, which he considered contrary to the spirit of the constitution."

"President Carnot had the highest conception of the office of president of the republic. He knew how to gain, privately and publicly, the sympathy and respect of France, and foreign lands by their unanimous sorrow have manifested their sympathy and admiration for the man, the citizen and the magistrate, and more especially for the man of peace, to the maintenance of which he devoted all of his efforts.

Premier Dupuy then traced the life of the late president, reviewing his increasing popularity before his death, and concluded his address with saying:

"France feels the greatness of its loss. We thank you for having prepared a union of its sons with the common love for the republican and for the fatherland. We will retain your memory in order to better serve the republic and will ever keep in view the honor of France."

"The republic lays upon your coffin a flag draped with mourning. Deign to accept this supreme homage of gratitude and sorrow."

**Assassination In Italy.**

**LIZZIE HALLIDAY IS DEAD.**

**MIDDLETON, N. Y., June 29.—Mrs. Lizzie Halliday was a passenger on the Ontario and Western train which reached here. She was violent from the time she was placed on the train and screamed at the top of her voice. The other passengers left the car when Bloomingburg was announced by the brakeman, this being the nearest station to Lizzie's former home. She became frantic with rage and the sheriff and his deputy finally placed a gag in her mouth. She was taken from Cornwall to Albany and thence to Plattsburgh by wagon to Danemore.**

**Taxation of Church Property.**

**ALBANY, June 29.—Ex-Senator Daniel McMillan appeared before the taxation committee to argue on the measure favoring taxation of church property.**

**Chichester, he said, was protected by the government and should pay for it. If a church is desecrated the county has to pay for it. In addition to taxing churches he would tax all county and city property and in fact everything except state property.**

**This committee had expected to be addressed by several other speakers, but the matter was postponed.**

**Yale Again Victorious.**

**NEW LONDON, Conn., June 29.—Again did the sons of Eli lower the proud crest of their old rivals, the Harvardians. The blue shell finished 16 lengths ahead of the crimson in 23 min. 47 sec. in the Varsity boat race.**

**The Yale men set up straight and strong, none of them showing signs of weakness—a victorious crew never does but three of Harvard's men dropped forward over their oars, not faltering, but utterly exhausted by the long and hard struggle.**

**Gas Trust Dissolved.**

**CHICAGO, July 1.—Judge Winslow entered the decree with some modifications which was presented to him by the attorney general with the consent of the gas trust. The effect of the decree is to absolutely dissolve the trust and compel the gas companies and individuals interested in them to operate their interests separately.**

**Nicaragua's Naturalization Papers.**

**WASHINGTON, July 1.—Minister White has been notified that S. G. Kosinski, the Buffalo man who was released by the Sabora while visiting Nicaragua, was admitted in Newark, N. J., Oct. 14, 1901.**

## JAY SHEA'S TRIAL.

Witnesses Garrison, T. P. O'Neil, Captain West, money of the prosecution.

**TROY, N. Y., June 27.—In the Bat Shea trial, the cross-examination of the bar Michel was taken up by Mr. Pitt, but no important testimony was brought out.**

**Nicholas Longfellow, another 13-year-old boy, swore that he saw Shea shoot Ross. On cross-examination witness admitted that he heard some one say it was Bat Shea who did the shooting. "Shea," the witness continued, "looks like the man who shot Ross, but I'm not positive it was him."**

**The prosecution then undertook to connect Shea with the wholesale repeating which had been done in the various districts of the Thirteenth ward, but Mr. Pitt objected on the ground that any evidence as to what Shea did at any polling place other than the Thirteenth was incompetent.**

**Justice Williams overruled the objection and although Mr. Pitt took exception to all the evidence on this point, the people, after over a week of fruitless endeavor, succeeded in establishing a motive for Shea's crime. It is expected by counsel that the case for the people will rest tomorrow.**

**TROY, N. Y., June 28.—Ellias Falls was at the third district polling place when the shooting occurred; saw Ross struck, and also saw Hayner struck, but did not see who struck either of them.**

**Witness continued: "I heard firing; saw William Ross with blood on his head. Then I saw two men running on the vacant lot west of Orr street; one fired a shot and John H. Boland started after the man who fired the assassin. One of the two men I saw first was in a sitting position, and the man who fired was in front and shot directly at his breast. Boland had a tunic in his hand, but I did not see whether he struck the man he was chasing. I cannot tell who the man was who fired, but it was not Boland."**

**Fred Miller was another witness who saw Ross shot.**

**His description of the shooting was similar to that of the preceding witness. He said the assassin wore a green tie.**

**Duncan C. Kuyk, the next witness, also saw Shea shoot Ross. He only saw him fire one shot and it was fired into the back of Ross' head as Ross was on the ground.**

**Paul Emery, the next witness, saw the shooting from the window of his house. Saw a man sitting on the ground opposite the polling place and saw him shot by another man who stood in front of him. Saw a man run behind the man on the ground and fire a shot at the back of his head. Could not tell whether the assassin was wearing a green tie.**

**A mass meeting was held by the loyal Catholic Poles, of St. Stanislaus' parish, Cleveland, to take action upon the letter of Mgr. Stoll. They passed resolutions thanking Mgr. Stoll for his righteous decision, and assured him they would ever remain faithful to the Church.**

**A monster meeting of Catholics has been held at Mayence, Germany, to counterbalance the demand made by the Evangelical Synod of Hesse who protested against the recall of the Jesuits.**

The chapel, moreover, contains many symbolic pictures of great interest to Christian antiquarians.**

**In the address which he delivered in St. Peter's, Leo XIII combated the statement made by Crispini, who asserted that history would honor Pius IX for what that pontiff did in the earlier years of his pontificate the evident purpose of such an assertion being to intimate that Pius IX committed a blunder when he refused to make any terms with the usurpers of the Papal city. Leo XIII declared that one of the greatest glories of his predecessor's pontificate was precisely what Crispini would have the world consider a mistaken policy, to wit, his determined refusal to condone the opulence of the Holy See and his resistance to all efforts that aimed at lessening the loyalty to the Vatican of the Catholic world.**

**Steps are being taken in Brittany for the erection of a statue to Perrineau, the companion of Jeanne d'Arc, who was burnt by the English in front of Notre Dame in 1430.**

**The Very Rev. Provost Maguire, V. G., has been appointed auxiliary Bishop to His Grace Archbishop Eyré, of Glasgow. The appointment has given the greatest satisfaction to the priests and people of the Archdiocese.**

**According to the "Annals of London," there have been during the last year 700 stated cuts of 14 different descriptions through the inheritance of Our Lady of London, hundred of which estates not yet proved as such have been made in that year.**

**The London Tabloid announces that it has been definitely decided to begin the building of the Westminster Cathedral, if not immediately, at least in the near future. The new Cathedral is to be upon a scale in every way worthy of its purpose, and on the magnificent site which was selected some years ago, opposite the Archbishop's House.**</p
