## TRIBUTE TO CARNOT.

### EXERCISES AT THE CHURCH OF OUR LADY OF VICTORY.

Impressive services - memorial of M. Sadi Carnot, the murdered president of France, were held at the Church of Our Lady of Victory on Pleasant street last Sunday at 10:30 o'clock. The church was filled to overflowing. On one side of the altar hung the French flag and on the other that of the United States. The sanctuary was draped in mourning and was banked in palms.

Directly in front of the altar was placed a catafalque decorated with the French colors and a tri-colored wreath donated by the French people of this city. Leaning against the casket was a large picture of the martyred president. A candelabra of fifty tapers shed its light upon the catafalque. The guard of honor was composed of F. Stope, F. X. Rivard, Joe Giroux, E. H. Santena, A. LeGasse and U. Parr, of the Knights of St. John the Baptist. Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. A. Notteboert, Rev. Father Schmitt acting as deacon, and Rev. M. Gueack of Alton, Ill., as sub deacon.

The following is a translation of Rev. A. Notteboert's address, which was given in the mother tongue.

"Your presence at the foot of the Altar is a manifest proof of patriotic sentiments which animate the hearts of the French people. You have come to this place of worship to mourn the loss of a man who has been a martyr of his duty—a victim of his love for the order, the peace and welfare of his country."

"A wreath bladed by his exorable doctrine has borne a peroxide hand against the strongest person of the bravest leader of the people. Forty millions of devoted hearts would have disputed the honor of giving their life to preserve the great and beautiful Republic of France and her worthy President, so much lamented."

"To bear the sceptre and to rule as master over a nation by right is an honor, but to be chosen by a people great and illustrious as are the French people is a glory which is only equalled in our own dear country of adoption. Monsieur Sadi Carnot had shown himself worthy of the confidence and esteem of his fellow countrymen; he acquitted himself of his delicate task in an irreproachable manner. His dignity, his wisdom, his loyalty, are an object of envy to the crowned heads of Europe."

Let us teach by our example to all our fellow citizens a sacred respect for the law of the United States and may our expression of sympathy today be raised as protestation against acts of violence by those who permit themselves to be carried away by doctrine destructive to social order, which are so highly condemned by the church and all good men.

"A radical change of government in a country is always an important event; daring is necessary to inaugurate it, but it is necessary to have wisdom in order to maintain it; rebellious ambition of the conqueror, mourning of the vanquished are so many clouds charged with baneful electricity which are able at every instant to blow up and scatter, plunder, devastate and ruin. To place the republic upon a base where license only knows bounds, a base sure and solid where religious sentiment and political opinion could manifest itself, in a word to install into the veins of the young French republic a pure and quickening blood was the noble ambition of the one whose grief we bear today. May God give to the honorable successor the intelligent courage to follow a work so beautiful, so patriotic; for that our daily prayers ascend to the throne of Heaven, that the Lord may spare our mother country of such calamity, like that which breaks our hearts at this moment."

At the conclusion of mass all the male members of the congregation were invited to the school house to sign the memorial which will be sent to Madame Carnot through the French ambassador at Washington. A souvenir card enclosed in an envelope, was presented to all present.
