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# NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

## Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean.

### Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

**CONNAUGHT. LEINSTER.**

**GALWAY.**  
 A. F. Horne, Esq., R. M., has applied for a transfer. Mr. Horne was among the Lord Lieutenant's party in Connemara, recently, and doubtless, thinks he ought to be considered.

**LEITRIM.**  
 The Manorhamilton Board of Guardians have decided to consider no applications for cottages or allotments from laborers, under the Laborers Act, for the present year.

**MAYO.**  
 Mr. Andrew Bathgate, merchant, Main street, Castlebar, was received into the Catholic church, and baptized by Very Rev. P. Lyons, P. P. A few days before his sister, Mrs. Allen, received the sacrament of Baptism at the hands of Father O'Flaherty.

Some of the tenants on the Lambert property, in and around Claremorris, have received communications threatening them with legal proceedings for the recovery of a single half-year's rent falling due last month—no hanging gales allowed. Some of the poor tenants, now favored with these legal documents, paid in March or April last the half-year's rent that fell due last November.

Mr. James McGirr, of Louisburgh, has been appointed to the position of Petty Sessions Clerk of that district.

Dr. Conor, J. O'L. Maguire, of Claremorris, has been appointed to the Commission of the Peace for Mayo, and Dr. James J. Hopkins, of Leenane, for the county of Galway.

The Rev. Father McDermott, Adm., Westport, has been transferred by the Archbishop of Tuam to the parish of Clonberne, county Galway.

While some workmen were excavating near the station premises, at Killala, a few days ago, they came across some human bones which probably had lain there since the memorable year of the French invasion and landing at Kileummin head.

**ROSCOMMON.**  
 An application will be made by the Athlone Town Commissioners, before a Committee of the house of Lords, for control of the streets, bridges and footpaths of Athlone, and a right to levy a rate sufficient for their maintenance, as that at present being done by the Grand Juries of Roscommon and Westmeath. The Westmeath Grand Jury have already consented to the change, but the Roscommon Grand Jury refused to do so; which made it necessary for the Commissioners to take this step.

Acting-Sergeant Haggard has been transferred from Boyle to Furryty. Constable Hall has been transferred from Roscommon to Four Roads, and Constable Kemp has been removed from Four Roads to Lanesboro'.

**SLIGO.**  
 The Sligo board of Guardians and Dr. Murray are at loggerheads over the appointment of Mrs. Henry as infirmary nurse.

A man named James Mullen, a cooper by trade, aged about 40 years, was found dead in his bed, in Sligo, recently. He had been complaining the previous day of a pain and faintness about the region of the heart and had to leave off work on account of it, but no uneasiness was felt on this account by his friends. He was unmarried, and lodged in McMorow's of Pound street.

Very satisfactory progress is being made with the construction of the Calooney and Claremorris Railway line. Constant employment is afforded to a large number of men at the Claremorris end, and the work is being rapidly pushed forward. Operations are being carried on under the superintendence of Mr. Roche, C. E.

**QUEEN'S.**  
 The building of the new Catholic church in Abbeylisk is progressing rapidly. Most of the solid masonry work is completed, and the workmen are now engaged in fitting up the interior. It will be some time, however, before the whole is completed.

**WESTMEATH.**  
 Major-General Hutchinson, Royal Engineers, has been appointed by the Board of Trade to inspect the Canal between Dublin and Mullingar and

onwards, in consequence of the allegations made to the Department of the State of neglect into which it has fallen.

**WEXFORD.**  
 We regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas Finn, junior, which occurred at the residence of his father, at the Quay, New Ross.

**WICKLOW.**  
 The Ballinglass Board of Guardians, at a late meeting adopted a resolution proposed by Mr. J. H. Doleman, in favor of amnesty for the political prisoners. At the previous meeting of the Board the resolution passed by the Limerick Corporation calling on the Government to release the political prisoners was duly brought before the Board and proposed by one of the members for adoption, but the preceding chairman, Mr. E. A. Deans, refused to receive the resolution through all the Guardians, with one or two exceptions, were in favor of it.

**MUNSTER.**  
**CLARE.**  
 A Clareman has come in for one of Queen Victoria's 'Birthday honors.' Mr. E. C. Cullinan, of the Chief Secretaries Office, Dublin Castle, was granted the distinction of 'Commander of the Bath.' Mr. Cullinan is third son of Dr. P. M. Cullinan, J. P., of Ennis.

**CORK.**  
 The appointment of the Rev. M. J. Sheedy to the important parish of Baltimore has given great satisfaction to the parishoners of Clonakilly and Darrara, among whom he labored zealously and arduously for several years.

At the opening of the Trinity Sittings, recently, Mr. Hugh Keller, of Kanturk, was sworn in a solicitor of the Supreme Court of Judicature in Ireland. Mr. Keller was apprenticed to N. W. Keller, Esq., of Kanturk, and intends practicing in his native place.

Six vessels of the Channel Squadron arrived in Queenstown harbor, anchoring in the Man-o-War roads, off Whitegate. The fleet included four of the largest battle-ships in the British Navy. Their entrance was watched by many from points of vantage along the shore, while others went off in small boats. Another detachment of the Channel Squadron is expected to join them, preparatory to a cruise around the coast.

**KERRY.**  
 Sir Thomas Esmonde has been informed by the Postmaster-General that he has sanctioned an extension of the Castlemaine and Booter's post, on four days a week, in Castle drum, Whitegate Cross, and Tibbough Cottage.

A man named Patrick Brien, residing at Ballyfinane, has reported to the police that his house was attacked by a party of men, and his windows smashed with stones. Brien has been supplying the police with provisions, and to this he attributed the outrage.

**LIMERICK.**  
 A report from Bodyke states that two bullocks were discovered dead on one of Colonel O'Callaghan's evicted farms at Bodyke. A gate and pier were also destroyed on the lands. The police, who have reported the occurrences, are inquiring into them.

Mr. Cornelius Kelleher has disposed of his interest in the Hotel, Drumcollogher, to Mr. Hartly of Kilmallock, for £100. It pays a rent of £25, and has about an acre of land attached.

The striking which took place at the Army Clothing Factory has been left to arbitration, the employees resuming work pending the adjustment of their difficulties.

**TIPPERARY.**  
 At the Killenaula Petty Sessions, Acting-Sergeant Corry, R.I.C., was returned for trial to the Quarter Sessions.

**WATERFORD.**  
 Most Rev. Dr. Sheehan, Bishop of Waterford, consecrated the new burial ground which has been added to the grave-yard of the parish church, recently, by the Very Rev. Peter Casey, P.P., V.G., Dungarvan. The following priests were in attendance on the occasion:—Revs. E. C. Prendergast, P. O'Connor, and R. J. Casey, C.C.s., Dungarvan; Revs. W. Sheehy, P.P., and Michael Casey, Aglish; Revs. E. Moran, P.P., and J. O'Donnell, C.C., Old Parish; Revs. J. Caffray, P.P., and J. Ormonde, C.C., Abbeyside.

Recently, Alderman L. A. Ryan, J. P.; W. J. Smith, J. P., and Mr. P.
