### CATHEDRAL

J., of St. Louis University; Dr. Maurice F. Egan, of Notre Dame university, Indiana; Rev. P. A. Hurlbut, S. J., vice-president of St. Francis Xavier college, New York; Richard Clarke, LL. D.; Rev. Dr. Brann, of New York; Rev. G. M. Scarle, C. S. P., of the Catholic University of Washington; Professor Very Rev. F. W. Wayrich, C. S. S. R., and rector of St. Joseph's church in this city will preach before the summer school morning and evening of August 12th. Father Wayrich will also deliver a lecture on a special subject.

The order of Carmelite Fathers of Niagara Falls on the Canadian side, one of the oldest monastic orders in the world, laid the corner stone of their new \$50,000 hospice Monday, on which occurs the annual feast of the order. Archbishop John Walsh of Toronto and other prominent clergy from all over the Dominion and United States were present.

The music of the mass and at the ceremonies was rendered by the Holy Redeemer church choir of Rochester, led by F. W. Seibold. It was rendered by a double quartette, including Mrs. Frances Sireb, Miss Emma Waltz, Miss Rosa Stehle, Miss Aggie Abberger, Messrs Charles Dill, F. X. Fischer, Charles Dittmar and Charles Magin. Seibold's mass in G was sung and Rev. Pica K. Mayer, provincial of the Carmelite Order of America, from New Baltimore, Pa., conducted the mass, assisted by a brilliant array of clergy.

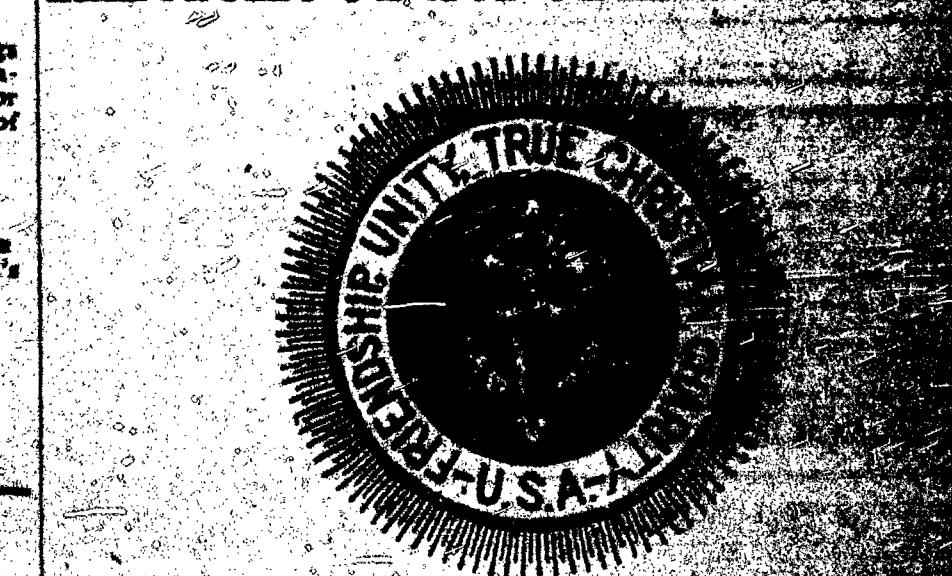
