Father Regan, of St. Michael's church; Rev. Father Von Weldon, assistant rector of Holy Family church. Dr. McLean, of St. Bernard's Seminary, was master of ceremonies. ### TRIBUTE TO ROCHESTER.

A Distinguished Visitor's Impression of the Flower City.

Rev. Mark S. Gross, a brother of the Archbishop of Oregon, spent several weeks recently with Rev. F. A. Hendrick of this city. Father Gross is a very scholarly gentleman, as well as a keen observer. He was deeply impressed with the flourishing condition of Catholicity in this diocese, and gave expression to his ideas in a lengthy letter to the Boston Pilot concerning Rochester's educational institutions he writes:

### CATHOLIC ROCHESTER.

Rochester is the Episcopal See of the Diocese of Rochester, the fairest spiritual daughter of the great ecclesiastical province of New York. Its Suffragan Sees number eight. The Diocese of Rochester has of all of them made the greatest advance. Comparisons are indeed invidious, except here, where spiritual wealth redounds to the honor and glory of the provincial household.

The most sanguine Catholic could hardly have hoped for the present magnificent Catholic progress in the course of twenty-five years; and that the new diocese, formed a quarter of a century ago out of a few poor missions and a single city of any now, would have in so short a period challenged competition in the whole country for the completeness and excellence of its ecclesiastical equipment. But this crowning result was indeed the work of the Holy Ghost. And the worthy instrument in his hands has been the first Bishop of Rochester, the Rt. Rev. Bernard McQuaid. At the age of seventy, he now reaps the fruits of his long episcopate. His flourishing diocese, devoted clergy and people are the crown and glory of his declining years.

### BISHOP MCQUAID AND THE SCHOOLS.

The prominent characteristic of the Rt. Rev. Dr. McQuaid as priest and bishop has been that of an educator. When priest in the Diocese of Newark, he founded in Seton Hall one of the first colleges of the country, and made it the Alma Mater of Catholic youth of wealthy American families.

Education has been the secret of Dr. McQuaid's unparalleled success as Bishop of Rochester. He aimed to make every Catholic child of his new and poor diocese to grow up with it a refined and cultivated Catholic member of society of whom the American public might feel proud. The Bishop grasped success in seizing the means thereto. Time proved it. His flock increased. His Catholic children were all saved to the faith, and an American Catholic citizenship secured that has rivalled the best in the land. The Catholics of Rochester are among the best educated in our country. Three years after his coming to Rochester the Bishop had been so successful in his parochial schools that in 1871 5,000 school children were seen marching in procession to the public square, where addresses were delivered in English, French and German. The Bishop employed both his gifted pen and eloquent speech in the cause of education, its paramount necessity and glorious fruits.

He opened the door of education to the most humble. Thought free and parochial, he provided these schools to have the most competent religious teachers. He established a uniform system for the whole diocese and adopted thereto, chiefly, two religious communities, the Sisters of St. Joseph for the English-speaking and the School Sisters of Notre Dame for the German children. His zeal also cherished the Sisterhood of Mercy. The Religions of the Sacred Heart and the Nazareth Sisters especially, he built up for institutes of higher education and art. The latter conduct a training school for teachers. The Religions of the Sacred Heart carry on also a free school.

With so admirable a system, the cause of Catholic education blossomed with fairest results. More than ten thousand children attend in Rochester alone the parochial schools. The academics are correspondingly well represented. Churches rose, as congregations swelled from the growth of the Catholic school system extended throughout the diocese. The city of Rochester now boasts of a grand cathedral and numerous churches.

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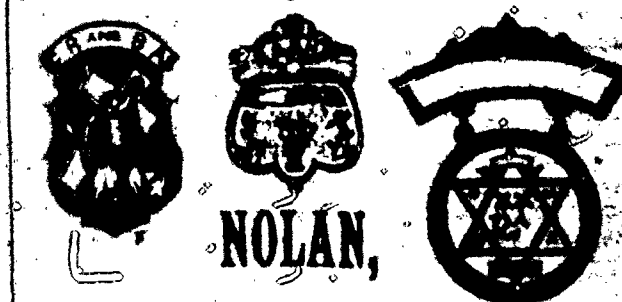

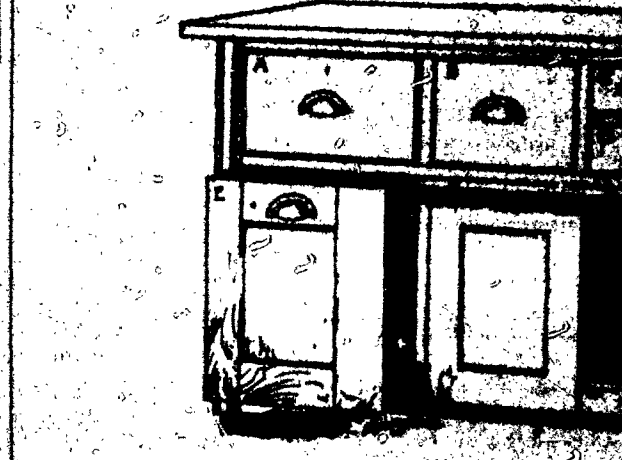
