with a Banquet. The fourth annual convention of the Supreme Council of the Catholic Relief and

Beneficiary association assembled Tuesday morning in Syracuse, N. Y. The organization was started about four years ago in the city of Auburn through the efforts of Thos. H. O'Neil, and now is has councils in most of the large cities and

The delegates met at St Mary's church in the morning to attend high mass preparafory to their assembling at the convention in the rooms Council 10, in the Nottingham block.

The convention was called to order by President O'Neil about 10 o'clock, and on the roll call it was found there were about 75 visiting delegates.

Bishop Ludden delivered an address welcoming the delegates to the city, and compliniented them on the good which has oc curred from an organization of its nature, The remainder of the morning was spent in considering the credentials of the del-

At 1 30 the convention assembled in executive session to consider amendments to the 2,000 people, most of them members by laws. The remainder of the day was spent in routine business and hearing reports of the various officers.

The morning session of the second day was devoted mostly to considering amendments to the constitution as suggested by the committee on taws. James Wood, of Bing-hamton, the Grand Scoretary, and organizer of sigarmakers union, delivered an address in the morning session.
