Bishop McQuaid of Rochester, to administer the Holy Sacrament of Confirmation to about eighty children, including those from Savannah Bishop McQuaid celebrated Mass at 7 a. m., and gave Holy Communion to those who were to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. At 11 a. m., High Mass was celebrated, Rev. Dr. McLean, of St. Bernard's Seminary, was the celebrant. At this Mass, Bishop McQuaid gave a powerful and eloquent sermon on "The Unity of the Christian Religion and the Sacraments." He also very kindly thanked both the people of Savannah and Clyde for their kindness and generosity towards that grand and noble work, St. Bernard's Seminary, of Rochester, which surpasses all others in the United States, especially its grand location.

At 4 p. m. Bishop McQuaid administered the Holy Sacrament of Confirmation. He then gave some very interesting remarks to the children, but he did not dwell long on the Sacrament of Confirmation, he knew, they were well instructed by our Rev. Pastor J. Gleeson, and it is the wish of all that his kind words of good advice will ever remain a deep impression on their young minds, especially against that great evil of intemperance. Rev. Father Kavanagh, of Lyons, and Rev. Father McGrath, of Auburn, assisted the Bishop. The church was over-crowded and many were obliged to remain standing. The choir rendered Leonard's Mass in E flat, and Misses Mary Murry and Katie Turney sang at the offertory, "Ave Maria." After Benediction, the choir rendered in a charming manner the "Te Deum."
