Catholic Reading Circles

The Board of Directors of the Catholic Summer School suggest a plan by which all the Catholic reading circles of the country will be placed under the control of that body. Its substance is:

That the Reading Circles in each district be organized so as to form a Central Board composed of representatives from the Circles; that from these Central Boards an Advisory board be formed, which shall act as an auxiliary to the Directing Board of the C. S. S., that this Directing Board prepare suitable, comprehensive and homogenous courses of reading, with a view to preparing the members for the work of ensuing sessions; that this Directing Board use these Central Boards as means for dissemination of Catholic truth in every convenient manner, as occasion shall require; that this Directing Board prepare a series of lectures in harmony with the course of reading, and suggest certain lectures; that the official organ of this Summer School be made to all intents and purposes a Catholic educational review for the furtherance of all interests of Reading Circles, parochial schools, Catholic colleges and convents, and that this matter be considered upon immediately; and that the proprietor of the Catholic Reading Circle Review be requested to change the name of said review to the *Catholic Review*, the organ of the Catholic Summer School, devoted to the interests named above.
