This place can be reached from all directions, north, east, south and west, by railroad. The taxes would be increased, out according to the assessment of 1893. Arcadia contained \$1,165,693 in real estate, and than a tax of 2 per cent, on the above amount, would more than pay for the buildings that Wayne county would want. The property would be increased in value \$100 on \$1,000, that is on the average. This question will probably be brought before the next session of the Board of Supervisors.
