

CRISP NEWS ITEMS.

HISTORY IN BRIEF OF THE WEEK'S HAPPENINGS.

Interesting News From All Parts of the Globe—Press Dispatches Show of Superfluous Words and Presented in Concise Form For Readers Whose Time Is Limited.

Communication with South Florida is being restored and special dispatches are pouring in relative to the damage done by the West Indian cyclone, which raged in the state. The dispatches all tell the same story of houses wrecked and crops destroyed, but no loss of life is reported.

The convention of the American Public Health Association at Montreal terminated and the delegates left by steamer to visit the Grosse Isle quarantine station in the River St. Lawrence, below Quebec.

Address from Shanghai say the emperor is dissatisfied with the course events are taking and that affairs are gradually working toward a coup d'etat. The Chinese warship Kwang-Chia is reported to have been lost while running from the mouth of the Yalu river.

Two men were burned to death, two other men and a little girl were badly injured and \$100,000 damage done by fire at Nantam, B. C. The fire started in the Royal hotel, which was destroyed. Hat, Mayor, bootblack, and a bar tender known in the hotel as Fritz were burned to death. Three guests were badly hurt.

John S. Johnson, the Syracuse bicyclist, knocked two seconds off the world's mile record, flying start, paced, held by Bliss, by covering the mile in 1:50.85.

The contract for protecting the hermit bank of the Cayuga and Seneca canals at the foot of Seneca lake was awarded to Fryer & Albana of Rochester, who bid \$10,738.

The officials of the Southern Pacific railroad company have decided upon a reduction all along the line. The first cut was made Monday, and this will be followed by a greater reduction in November.

John Kimmel, a lad aged 16 years, was drowned in Irondequoit bay, near Rochester, N. Y., as a result of going in water over his head. The body was recovered.

Word comes from Mosquito that the Americans there, realizing that their government is not likely to protect them, will take matters into their own hands. They are being robbed of their property in a barefaced manner.

A 7-year-old girl saved a passenger train on the Chicago and Great Western railroad near Dundee, Ia. She was seen by the engineer waving her little red apron as a signal. The engineer stopped the train and the little girl told him that the bridge around the curve was burning.

Lewis Johnston, a negro laborer, while digging a posthole on E. B. Shepard's farm near Mobile, Ala., came upon an iron box containing \$1,000 in gold coin. He turned it over to his employer. None of the coins bear a date later than 60 years ago.

M. E. E. Brewster, consul general of France at Chicago, will attend to the foreign office in Paris three days this week for the purpose of instructing all consuls on the American tariff law.

The Paris Temps says that M. Deprat, French ambassador to Great Britain, has resigned, and he will be succeeded by Baron de Courcel, who was president of the Behring sea tribunal of arbitration.

The Crown Point Printing works at Leeds, Vt., have been destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of \$100,000.

Five men were killed by a cave-in in a slate quarry at Probstville in Saxo-Meiningen, Germany.

At Phelps, N. Y., Martin V. Bateman, aged 45 years, a farmer, committed suicide by hanging. No cause assigned. He leaves no family.

Ball in the sum of \$10,000 has been accepted for John W. Love, the First National bank cashier, of Watkins, N. Y., who is in Buffalo under indictment for embezzlement. His bondsman is Matthew H. Arnot of Elmira.

It is known that one Juan Alcain is on the trail of General Antonio Ereta of Salvador with orders to kill him. It is said he is the avenger of a person murdered by Ereta's order.

The proprietors of the Chicago Tribune emphatically deny the statement made by a Philadelphia paper of the sale of the Tribune to H. H. Kohlsaat to any persons or syndicates. The property is not for sale.

United States Marshal Greer and his deputy marshals left Ashland, Ky., for Louisville with 100 moonshiners just from the Upper Big Sandy district. The party is made up of women, boys and men, some of the latter typical desperadoes.

Following the sensational disclosures of fraud on the part of Canadian Grand Trunk railway conductors and agents in Montreal came the arrest of two well-known conductors, Samuel Defries and Frederick Ramblin, living there. Warrants are out for others and startling revelations are promised.

M. Parker Kotchum of Brighton, Ont., who gained considerable notoriety on account of owning "Doc," champion trotting dog, took his life while temporarily insane, occasioned by financial reverses.

Philip C. Riley, consular agent of the United States at Boca Delton, Columbia, is dead.

The government of Guadalupe has declared a quarantine against all arrivals from Salvadoran ports.

A cyclone struck Wichita, Kan. The damage in the city is \$50,000. Two people are known to be killed.

The premier of Ontario has agreed to perform the ceremony of unveiling the monument to Sir John A. Macdonald in Toronto on the 16th inst.

Work on a somewhat limited scale has been resumed on the Panama canal. The resumption of work was marked by no evidences of enthusiasm.

The eastbound shipments from Chicago last week amounted to 53,553 tons, against 55,473 for the previous week and 51,157 for the corresponding week of last year.

The Portuguese government has decided to send two warships to Lourenco Marques, where rebellious natives are in armed opposition to the Portuguese authorities.

A detachment of Dutch troops were led into an ambush which had been set for them by Malacca rebels on the island of Leyak. A captain and lieutenant were killed and 30 men were wounded. The troops were led into the ambush by the rebels who were waiting for the opportunity of a spate.

WILL ALL ACCEPT.

So Chairman Blackley Says of the Democratic Nominations.

BROOKLYN, Oct. 3.—The Eagle says: "We have every reason to believe that Judge Gray will accept the nomination of this Saratoga convention," said Chairman Blackley of the Democratic state committee to an Eagle reporter. "Neither of the three candidates has as yet been formally notified of his nomination. Just when they will be notified has not been determined, nor can it be until we know whether they are to be candidates of a harmonious Democracy or whether there is to be a hotting ticket. The candidates will be notified by letters, the form of which will depend very much upon the situation which we will be obliged to confront. I repeat, however, there is no doubt that the nominations will all be accepted."

Judge Gray, who was seen by a reporter in circuit court chambers, declared, with emphasis: "I have heard nothing from the notification committee. In fact, I do not know who are its members. Further than this I have nothing to say."

Anti-Tammanyites Feel Hopeful.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Messrs. Grace, Fairchild, Scott and Monroe of the New York state Democracy held a conference with the executive committee of the "seventies." The conference lasted an hour and ex-Mayor Grace and his followers appeared in good humor when they left the committee. They declared no result had been arrived at, but that things look more promising. The committee of seventy will hold a general meeting this afternoon.

Republican Deadlock at Saratoga.

SARATOGA, Oct. 3.—The Twenty-second congressional district Republican convention reached the 17th ballot without result. Each ballot has been General Curtis of St. Lawrence, 15; General W. B. French of Saratoga, 9; Judge A. D. L. Baker of Fulton, 9.

Mrs. Peary's Indignant Denial.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Mrs. Peary, wife of Lieutenant Peary, the explorer, made an indignant denial of the charges made by W. F. Swain, one of the members of the expedition, against Lieutenant Peary's conduct and also the food furnished. As to the charge of ungentlemanliness Mrs. Peary said that her husband was overgenerous in his treatment of the men.

REACHING A CLIMAX.

LEWIS COMMITTEE LOOKING FOR BIGGER GAME.

Another step toward the throne taken. Chief Clerk at Police Headquarters on the stand — Ex Police Commissioner Heelan Testifies — Corporation Counsel Clark Called.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The Lewis committee resumed its investigations into the police department after a two weeks' vacation taken to allow the members to attend the state conventions of the Republican and Democratic parties.

It is evident that matters are rapidly reaching a climax. The beginning of the end is apparently in sight.

Commenting with the criminals, the worst men and women in New York city as witnesses, Mr. Gill, the attorney who has been conducting the investigation, has steadily been moving upward in the scale of humanity. The testimony of ex-officers and former policemen having been taken just before adjournment the prosecution took another step nearer the throne when Major William H. Kipp, chief clerk at the police headquarters, was called as the first witness of the day.

His testimony referred largely to the matter appearing in the records and was to some extent of a routine nature.

Then came ex-Police Commissioner Charles J. MacLellan.

He was an unusually large-attended group of attorneys and ministers when the session commenced.

Among the witnesses was Corporation Counsel Clark.

The interest in the proceedings continues unabated.

After the examination of several other witnesses the committee adjourned for the day.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Chief Counsel Gill surprised the Lewis committee. He subpoenaed all the members of the force who had been convicted of clubbing citizens during the past year, but who for some reasons have remained prisoners on the force. There are nearly 400 cases of this character and almost all of the officers summoned were in attendance.

One of the first officers who testified was Thomas Coleman, who had been called to explain his statements in connection with the alleged assault upon George A. Appel, the proprietor and the innkeeper of the hotel where Appel was injured in that Appel cut his own throat.

Coleman, being placed upon the stand, claimed that Appel had attempted to kill him, that he had attempted to shoot him, and that he had been severely wounded. He was subjected to a severe cross-examination by Mr. Gill, and though he could not shake the policeman's story the officer was badly routed.

The feature of the day, however, was the testimony of the new accused of clubbing citizens, many surprising stories of inhumanity were told by the witnesses.

A son of Rev. Dr. John Hall, the Presbyterian divine, claimed that he had been forcibly ejected from a station house because he had gone there and protested against an assault by an officer upon an Italian, four policemen. A Columbia college student told of the assaults that the policeman
