### SUPPLEMENT CONVENTION

Last week we gave the proceedings of the Supreme Council convention for Tuesday.

On Wednesday certain amendments to the constitution were adopted, including one providing for the payment of the sum of fifty dollars to the organizer of each new branch of twenty members.

The amount of per capita tax to be paid to the Supreme Council was increased from thirty to forty per cent of the amount collected from members.

During this session Rev. Dr. Loughlin, chancellor of the archdiocese, delivered a cablegram from Pope Leo through Cardinal Rampolla, charging Archbishop Ryan to impart the Apostolic benediction to the president and members of the association.

The convention gave three rousing cheers for Pope Leo, for the Apostolic Delegate, Monseigneur Satolli, and for Archbishop Ryan.

On Thursday morning the delegates called on the Archbishop, from whom they received the Apostolic benediction and the assurance of his full approval. During the day the delegates learned of the proposed organization of four new branches in the city.

Amendments adopted included the substitution of triennial for biennial sessions, the payment of assessments on the first of each month instead of twenty days after notice, and notices to be sent branches instead of to individual members.

The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: Supreme president, Michael Brennan, of Detroit; first vice president, John E. Molamphy, Pittsburg; second vice president, John Fitzgerald, New York; supreme recorder, O. J. Hickey, Brooklyn; treasurer, James M. Welsh, Hornellsville; marshal, D. D. Hughes, Titusville, Pa.; guard, J. B. Drury, Quebec; trustees, W. J. Belger, Chicago; Rev. M. J. Keen, Bergen, N. J.; holding over; Rev. P. A. Baart, Marshall, Mich.; William Franklin, Buffalo, and Frank Randall, Cleveland, Ohio; committee on laws, John J. Hynes, Buffalo; Eugene Bertrand, Buffalo; N. P. Whelan, Cleveland; finance committee, James A. Flanagan, Seneca Falls, N. Y.; James L. Whalen, Rochester; John H. Breen, Detroit; legal adviser, J. F. Keens, Detroit. These officers were installed in the next place of meeting.

On Thursday evening the Board of Trustees met and elected Rev. P. A. Baart, chairman; Bishop Ryan, of Buffalo, supreme spiritual adviser, and Dr. Kinsler, of Omaha, Neb., supreme medical adviser. Grand Rapids, Mich., was decided upon as the next place of meeting.

## THE A. O. H.

Approved by the Hierarchy of America—  
The Organization Proclaimed "A Most Admirable Society."

Of the fourteen Archbishops of the Catholic Church in America ten attended the annual meeting held Oct. 10th, at the residence of Archbishop Ryan, Philadelphia. Those present were Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, who presided; Archbishops Ryan, Corrigan, Williams, Elder, Hennessy, Feehan, O'Connell, Kain, Ireland, and Bishop Fitzgerald, of Little Rock, who represented Archbishop Janeau, of New Orleans.

None of the prelates would say, immediately after adjournment, what had been done, further than that the matters discussed were those of Church discipline. In the evening, however, at the banquet given the Church officials by the Catholic Total Abstinence Union of Philadelphia at the Continental Hotel, Archbishop Ryan said that the subject of the official recognition of the Ancient Order of Hibernians was the one subject upon which there was a long discussion. It was shown that the order now numbers over 100,000 members in the United States and that its national chaplain was a bishop; that it had bishops and numerous priests in its ranks, and that note but Catholics were admitted. After a full and free talk it was unanimously decided to recognize the Ancient Order of Hibernians as a most admirable society.

President Patrick O'Neill of the Ancient Order of Hibernians said that night that the formal recognition of the order was the one thing needed for the quadrupling of its membership. He said the national directors would be called in session at once to acknowledge properly the action of the highest Church dignitaries in the country. A meeting of all the Philadelphia divisions will be held next week.

Division No. 3 will hereafter hold their meetings on the first and third Mondays at the Cathedral Hall. This is a change of both meeting night and place of meeting.
