

For Member of Congress—HENRY C. BREWSTER.

Just a word as to the Congressional situation. The Republican nomination in this district has been given to Henry C. Brewster of Rochester, N. Y., who has been one of the most ardent and prominent members of the party for these many years. He has marched in the ranks with the boys out of preference, time and time again, and has always been found doing his whole duty in the place allotted to him by the campaign managers. He will faithfully attend to the interests of his neighbors, whose cause must also be his when the roll is called in the Fifty-fourth Congress, which must, above all things, be republican in its complexion. COREA.

The following item of Catholic news regarding the introduction of Christianity into Corea, is interesting at the present time, that unfortunate country being the seat of war between China and Japan. Christianity appeared in Corea in advance of the missionaries in 1777, some of the natives having received Christian books translated from the Chinese, in which the Jesuit precepts and teachings were set forth. In 1794 a Chinese Jesuit went thither and organized a little company of the faithful, but in 1801 he was slain. Thereafter, for thirty years, no missionary came; but in 1855 they appeared again, French Jesuits this time, disguised as mourners, which in the Korean cities keep to the obscurer thoroughfares, and neither speak nor are spoken to by others. They ministered secretly to the little flock which remained, performing their religious ceremonies at dead of night in the Christian houses, but in 1839 were found out, and they, too, were destroyed. After an interval of some years, and in 1866 there were also sacrificed, together with a considerable number of believers, men, women and children, who were offered pardon if they would abjure their faith

but not one was found to do this, and they were all beheaded. Since 1885 Christian mission work, Protestant and Catholic alike, has been unimpeded, but this recital of its initial step, says the New York Tribune, will serve to show the bitterness of the way these traversed, and the courage, fortitude and fidelity of the early workers there. If the blood of the martyrs is yet the seed of the Church, the harvest in that far-off and mysterious land, ought to be an abounding one. An American flag, 36x20 feet, was raised upon a flag pole 107 feet high, at the parochial school house of St. Clement's Church, Paschalville, Pa., under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, by whom it was presented. The flag raising was preceded by a parade. A meeting, held in the school yard after the parade, was presided over by Daniel Dougherty, who after a few patriotic remarks, introduced Magistrate Maurice F. Wilbere, who presented the flag upon behalf of the Order. The flag was accepted by Rev. Joseph V. O'Connor, who explained the significance of the emblem.

Carrie Nix, colored, aged twenty-two years, of Pine Bluff, Ark., became novice in the Order of Oblate Sisters of Providence, at St. Francis Academy, Chase and Forest Streets, Baltimore, Md. She was received into the order by the Rev. A. B. Lesson, Rev. Francis X. Brady, of Loyola College, spoke of the significance of the vocation of a religious. Rev. John A. Morgan, president of the Loyola College, was in the sanctuary. The novice was educated at St. Elizabeth's Academy, St. Louis, and is the first of the colored race to enter the Sisterhood from Arkansas. \$100 Reward, \$500.


