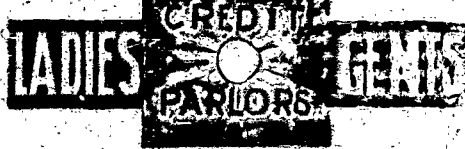

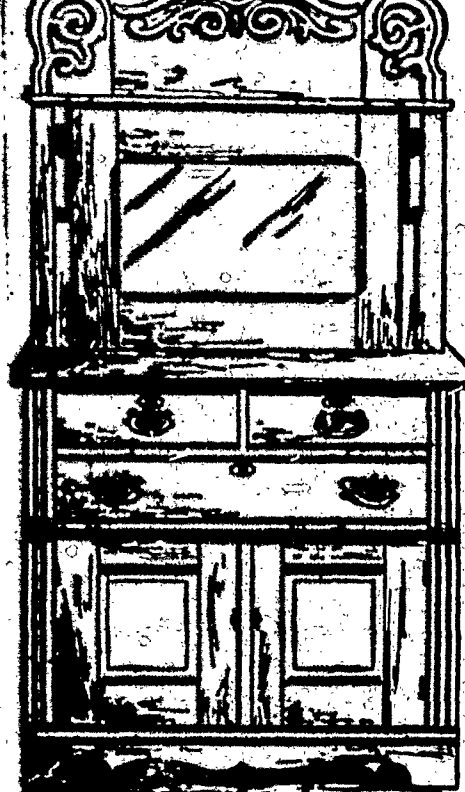

REPUBLICAN TREASON.

The Irish World in an excellent article on the A. P. A. says "If in our soul we could get ourselves to believe that the Republican Party was in any way affiliated with this un-American conspiracy—if any such charge could be demonstrated—then we say that we could not, and would not, cast a vote or say a word in behalf of the Republican Party over again. No Catholic could do so. The Irish World has done more for the success of the Republican Party than any other newspaper in the United States. Yet the protest of Patrick Ford and other Catholic Republicans against the A. P. A. being caudled by that party is treated with not only indifference but contempt. The same or similar protests have been made in several other states, where the black plague organization struck the soil with similar results. Even the venerable and over-praised Levi P. Morton, candidate for governor of New York, is not over demonstrative in his denunciation of the A. P. A. brigands. He doesn't even name them, or say he is opposed to their methods or principles, but simply quotes a sentence from the U. S. Constitution, and makes it his own. Mr. Morton must know that any citizen of the United States, who is not in favor of the 'fullest freedom in the worship of Almighty God' and all other provisions of the Constitution is himself a traitor and unworthy of citizenship under the protection of this free government. We know of no class of American citizens except Anarchists, Infidels and Apostates that are not in favor of what Mr. Morton says he is, as quoted above, and all who are not in favor of it are traitors to the country, to the flag and to the Constitution, no matter under what cloak they may try to hide themselves and mislead the public. But Mr. Ford says 'the Republican Party can never be guilty of this great crime and blunder of affiliating with the A. P. A.' Brother Ford you are like the man in jail when his attorney said to him 'they can't put you in jail for that,' 'Faith, said he, 'I am in it now.' The Republican Party has been guilty of 'this great crime and blunder of hugging to their bosoms the hideous reptile known as Apalism, and as you say 'no Catholic can vote for that ticket,' we have often said so, without stultifying himself and becoming a scullion for the Orange flat-heads of Belfast, Ireland, and their ignorant dupes in this country. A great many Catholic politicians will vote for the nominees of the Republican Party even if every candidate was an A. P. P., because they are Catholics in name only, or what is termed liberal Catholics. But Patrick Ford is a Catholic in the fullest sense of the word and will not be trodden underfoot by a party he was instrumental in building up and holding together. He was at the front, like many thousands of his countrymen fighting for the Institutions and flag of his adopted country when the Traynors, the Beatties, the Simses and the Nelsons, were drumming up Orangeism and discord in Ireland, or organizing fire-in-the-rear brigades in Canada, with a view of burning up the cities of the northern states. And yet, strange to say, the Republican party, which claims to have fought all the winning battles of the late war, with Democratic generals however, has more respect for those same Traynors, Beatties, Simses and Nelsons, than they have for the men whose valor and blood made it possible for that party to be in power in the United States for over a quarter of a century. Is such a party worthy of the support of honest patriotic citizens? There are stags in the Democratic party also, but they are in an insignificant minority, individuals who are soon discovered and dropped. There is no slurring the question of A. P. A.ism by such public men as David B. Hill of New York, United States Senator, or of S. K. Hamilton of Massachusetts, candidate for Congress; or Governor Stone of Missouri; or Rev. M. Gladden of Washington, D. C. They are unequivocal in their denunciation of the A. P. A. They are Democrats. Who has heard Gov. McKinley, ex-President Harrison or Levi P. Morton, or any other Republican, with the single exception of Tom Reed of Maine, openly denounce the A. P. A., not one. Why in the state of Illinois, the different Republican factions are tumbling over each other to secure the votes of this Luciferian organization. If Mr. Patrick Ford needs further evidence of the affiliation of the Republican party with the A. P. A., let him look over the field. Then if he elects

to continue as a hewer of wood and drawer of water for the A. P. A. and their cohorts, the Republicans, he will no doubt ornament the front page of his paper with portraits of Republican A. P. A. leaders. But if he is satisfied that what we assert, without fear of contradiction, that the Republican party is affiliated with this proscriptive organization, then he will perhaps present the Hon. David B. Hill as a front piece to his paper. It is not in a partisan spirit we refer to this subject. If the Democratic party were to slobber over this traitors' band, as the Republicans are doing, we would denounce it also. No compromise with traitors.

A LETTER FROM PARIS.

The most interesting topic now discussed in Paris, is the humiliation of Pere Hyacinthe, who has been relegated to the obscurity of a simple layman by the Archbishop of Utrecht. Father Hyacinthe, is, it appears, somewhat of a politician, or at least familiar with their ways. Seeing no prospects of promotion in the regular line in his now love, the 'old Catholic Church,' so-called, and being ambitious to wear the mitre, he resigned the humble position of ordinary pastor with a view being elevated to the position of Primate of the Gallican Catholic Church, and with that intention, he surrendered his church to the Dutch 'old Catholics,' with the understanding, his American female companion says, that he would be allowed to preach occasionally from his own pulpit. But his successor has absolutely excluded him from any connection with the church. Mr. M. Volel, who is the pastor in charge, states that the reasons are, that the Dutch old Catholics will not permit a married priest to have charge of souls, besides Pere Hyacinthe's eccentric character would unfit him for the office of primate. In addition to which, the marrying of a widow is an unpardonable sin, in the eyes of the Dutch 'old Catholics.' So the once popular and eloquent monk of the Catholic Church, is now virtually an outcast, even his new friends have gone back on him. It is said he contemplates returning to the Church of Rome once more, and is now in retreat. Remorse of conscience, no doubt, has much to do with his unhappy condition.

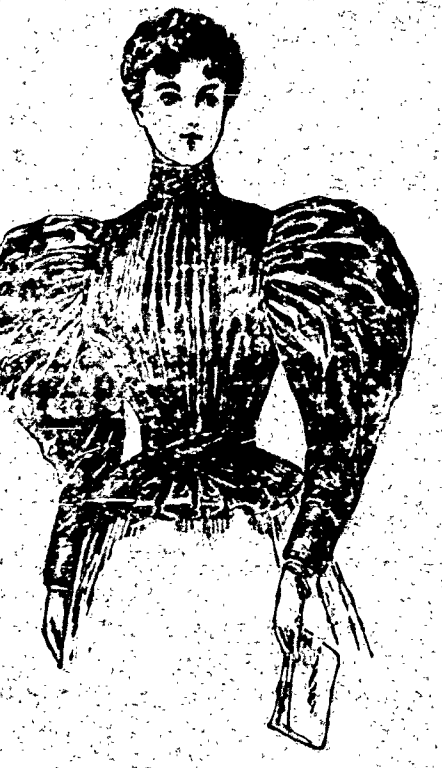
