Michael H. Maloney died Monday at his late residence, 95 Hamilton Place, aged 55 years. He leaves a wife and three sons, Thomas J., Frank D. and George A. Maloney, of this city; also two brothers, Thomas H. Maloney, of this city, and Dennis Maloney, of Toledo, O., and one sister, Mrs. J. Kennedy, of this city. Mr. Maloney was a member of Branch 12, O. M. B. A.

The funeral of the late Michael H. Maloney took place from his late residence, 95 Hamilton Place, Wednesday morning at 8:30 o'clock and from St. Mary's Church at 9 o'clock.

Patrick J. Connolly, formerly of this city, died Nov. 17th, at Chicago. He was buried at Muskegon, Mich. He was a brother of Officer Andrew Connolly and George Connolly and also of the late Morris and John O. Connolly, of this city.

Louise Gray, an infant child, died Sunday at the home of her parents, 2 State street. The funeral was held Monday, the interment being in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

Mrs. Eleanor P. Ryan, widow of the late Patrick Burke Ryan, died at 7 a. m. Tuesday in St. Mary's Hospital, aged 91 years. Deceased, with her husband, came to this city from Ireland 47 years ago. The surviving relatives are two sons, Robert P., of this city, and Michael, of Memphis, Tenn.

Death of James J. O'Connor.

James J. O'Connor died of heart failure after a short illness, on December 8th, at his late residence, 168 North street. He leaves a widow, two sons and seven daughters, three of whom are religious, two are of the Ursuline Order and one a Madam of the Sacred Heart. Deceased was born in Ireland 68 years ago. He came to America when young and engaged in the produce business in New York City. He afterwards entered into partnership with James Judge, and the firm of O'Connor & Judge was one of the first and best-known in that business throughout the country. During the famine in Ireland they were the first to send a shipload of provisions to the suffering poor. He was a man of sterling qualities and most earnest in his deeds of charity. His funeral took place from St. Bridget's Church on Tuesday morning at nine o'clock. Solemn High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev. James O'Connor, of Seneca Falls, as deacon, and Rev. Thomas Rosolier as subdeacon, Rev. Dr. Hanna as master of ceremonies. Among the other clergy in attend-

ance were Rev. John Cadyre, of Fairport, Rev. F. Oberholser, Rev. Albanus Notbeck and Rev. F. Libart. The interment took place at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, where the services were most impressive. The priest, who was on the altar assisted at the blessing at the grave. A full choir was present, assisted by Miss Francis Moran, who sang a hymn to the Sacred Heart with much feeling. The pall bearers were Ex-Mayor Carroll, John Cooper, D. B. Murphy, James Fee, J. Connell and B. O'Reilly.
