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NEWS DOTS FROM IRELAND

Interesting Paragraphs Concerning the Doings of Our Friends Across the Ocean.

Gathered from All Parts of the Emerald Isle for Our Readers.

CONNAUGHT. LEINSTER.

GALWAY. Colonel Nolan, M.P., has given a reduction of 25 per cent. to his tenants and Ballyhean tenants, County Galway.

Captain R. N. A. Flanagan, 1st Battalion Royal Irish Regiment, has been appointed Adjutant of the 4th Battalion Connaught Rangers (Galway Militia).

LEITRIM.

At a meeting of the Drumshambo I. N. Federation, an evicted tenant named Farrell Ryan came before the meeting, and his case when reported into revealed a pitiful state of affairs. The case is even more cruel than that of the Widow Kitterick, which excited such sympathy a short time ago. Lady Lennau is the owner of the land, and Mr. Teggington Tatlow is the agent. In the winter of 1912 when Ryan's rent fell due, he was unable to pay owing to the loss of cattle and reverses of the season, and he went and told the agent this, asking a little time, and offering a portion of the money. The agent refused to take a shilling under the full amount, and said he would not give Ryan any time. Immediately before he was evicted, in January, 1892, he managed by some means to scrape a year's rent together and forwarded it to Mr. Tatlow by a neighbor, himself being unwell. The agent refused to accept it without the addition of the law costs incurred, which, of course, it was utterly impossible that the poor tenant could obtain, and in course of the following week himself, wife, and five delicate children were thrown on the roadside. One of his neighbors, Mr. Thomas McLoughlin, a most respectable farmer, took compassion upon the poor man and his destitute family and gave them an old outhouse, where he intended they should stay until they could find a more suitable place, or be restored to their holding again. The poor man remained in this little cabin, until a month ago, when Mr. McLoughlin got a notice to quit. Ryan, hearing this, left immediately with his helpless family, rather than be the means of getting his benefactor into trouble, and since then he and his little ones are huddled together in a shanty by the roadside, in the most wretched condition, and dare not enter a house lest they should bring disaster to the occupants. A resolution was unanimously adopted, after the question was fully discussed, calling on the people of Drumshambo and the neighboring parishes to assemble and erect a house for the evicted tenant, and the secretary was directed to acquaint the county members of the facts.

KILDARE.

We regret to announce the death, at an advanced age, of Mr. P. Hughes, of Tandragee, father of Rev. Thomas Hughes, O.P., Athy. In consequence of an outbreak of scarlatina in the Moon district of the Athy Union, the Athy Board of Guardians have ordered that Moon National School be closed for the next month.

Mr. W. McAulliffe, of Waterford Lodge, supplied the winners of two races at Manchester, England, namely, Astrea and Lord Percy. At Leicester, also, two Irish racers carried off the first prizes in the principal events.

KILKENNY.

Rev. Father Feohan, P.P. Castle town, has been nominated for the position of delegate for the Queen's County on the Council of the Irish National Federation. Father Feohan is one of the true types of saggart who are cherished in the hearts of our race the world over. His services to the National cause extend back through decades of consistent devotion to the old days of the Land League, when, as a curate in Rathdowney, he displayed a patriotic spirit that Hucksbot Forster could not quell, even by a term of six months imprisonment.

LOUTH.

The Neptune Hotel, at Bettystown, near Drogheda, has been purchased by Mr. Crossley, on behalf of the Irish Tourist Development Company. That gentleman with Mr. R. D. O'Callahan, solicitor, Drogheda, who is acting for the company, recently inspected the concern, and arrangements are in progress to have the hotel fitted up in first class style. The strand between Laytown and Bettystown is admitted to be one of the finest in Ireland. Hot, tepid, and cold baths at the hotel will be provided, and it is intended that bathing boxes shall be erected on the strand for the convenience of visitors.

MEATH.

The Dublin 'Young Ireland' (Athletic Club) have been ordered to play off the draw match with the Navan Mahonys for the Leinster Championship, Mr. J. Kenny, referee, at Navan, or forfeit the match, by the Central Council's orders.

QUEEN'S.

According to a return laid before the Mountmellick Board of Guardians, by the clerk, a sum of £1,138 3s. 2d. had been lodged to the credit of the Union by the different rate collectors. There remained, however, a balance of £900 against the Guardians. It was ordered that the collectors lodge £200 each within the ensuing fortnight.

WESTMEATH.

It is stated that the Most Rev. Dr. Nulty, Bishop of Meath, is to be appointed Archbishop of Trebizonde, in partibus, and that he will be elevated and at the same time relegated.

WEXFORD.

At the Leinster Winter Assizes, Edward Davis, charged with assault at Enniscorthy, was acquitted and discharged. Mathew Reilly, charged

with criminal assault at Bray, was also acquitted. For the manslaughter of John O'Neill, at Crolougher, Patrick Thompson was awarded nine months imprisonment, and Bernard Thompson and Michael O'Neill six months each. Arthur McDonagh and John McDonagh, alias Sweeney, for having, at Birr, a coling mould, were sentenced to twelve months imprisonment, each.

WICKLOW.

At the adjourned meeting of the Father Healy Memorial Committee, in the Selbourne Hotel, Dublin, recently, Master Pigot presiding, it was resolved, on the motion of the Rev. Dr. Haughton, seconded by Lord Monk, that a cottage hospital should be established in Little Bray, to bear the name of Father Healy. It was directed to proceed on the plan adopted in Massachusetts, and to erect building, a block at a time, so that the charity should come into practical operation as soon as possible.

MUNSTER.

CLARE. Ballykeale House, the residence of Mr. O'Donnellan Blake Forster, was burned to the ground recently. Ballykeale is within half a mile of the village of Kilmorra, and has been, since the eviction of Mr. Forster, by the Court of Chancery, in possession of a man named Murray, who lately became bankrupt, and had cleared out, giving up possession. Murray had been under police protection while living in Ballykeale. The origin of the fire is unknown, but incendiarism is suspected.

CORK.

Alderman E. Walsh has been appointed High Sheriff of the city of Cork for the ensuing year. The case in which a man named Coughlan, of Schull, is charged in connection with the death of the late Philip Attridge, has been adjourned to the sitting of the Assize Court, in Cork.

At the Cork Police Court John Gleeson, a private in the Dublin Fusiliers, who pleaded guilty to stealing £1 1s. 6d. from a man named James Pickford, was sent to jail for two months with hard labor.

At the annual general meeting of the Cork Savings Bank, the statement of accounts was adopted unanimously. The working of the Bank was declared to be extremely satisfactory. It being mentioned that there was a surplus of £12,717 to the credit of the institution.

KERRY.

Enormous quantities of herrings were taken recently off the coast of Kerry. Prices were very low, the fish having to be sold at wholesale for from sixpence to eightpence a hundred to the dealers.

At the Munster Winter Assizes, a misshapen dwarf, wearing petticoats, named Patrick Brownan—usually known as 'Paddy Wad'—was found guilty of the manslaughter of an old woman named Mary Mackenzie, at Fries. He was sentenced to twenty years penal servitude. The prisoner was eccentric, and used to wear petticoats instead of trousers, to conceal his deformity. He was a 'pet' of Mr. Maurice Leonard, the agent of Lord Kenmare.

LIMERICK.

Alderman P. Keena has been re-appointed High Sheriff of Limerick City.

At the last meeting of the New-castle West Board of Guardians a resolution was forwarded for adoption by the Athea Democratic Labor Federation, calling on the Chief Secretary to open relief works in consequence of the distress caused by the potato crop failure. The Board adopted the resolution unanimously.

TIPPERARY.

A highly representative meeting of Nationalists was held in the Catholic National Club, Clonmel, recently, for the purpose of selecting a candidate for the position of County Delegate on the National Council of the Federation. The chair was taken by Mr. William O'Loughlin, F.L.G. Mr. Moclair, P.L.G., proposed Mr. Nicholas Kichham Shee, J.P., chairman of the Callan Board of Guardians, as candidate. Mr. J. P. Fox, Grand-mockler, said he had much pleasure in seconding the nomination of Mr. Shee, a Nationalist who not only worked well for his country in the present, but had done so in

the past, and stood high in the National ranks. The Chairman asked if any other candidate to be proposed, and receiving no answer, Mr. Moclair's proposition to elect Mr. Shee, and it was carried unanimously.

ULSTER.

ANTRIM.

At the Ulster Winter Assizes two barrister clerks were sentenced to six and 10 months imprisonment respectively for conspiring to defraud. The names of the clerks are not given, but it is stated that they were clerks of the County of Antrim, and that they were employed by a firm of solicitors in Belfast. A girl named Lizzie Parr was sentenced to three years' penal servitude for fatally stabbing a man named Adam Maxwell, during a quarrel, in Belfast.

ARMAGH.

Coroner Small held an inquest, at Forkhill, on the body of Henry Toal, an ex-Artilleryman, who died suddenly. Dr. Potts said that death was due to natural causes, and a verdict was accordingly returned.

CAVAN.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed Mr. Michael Arthur McGovern, P.L.G., of the parish of Grangeville, to the Commission of the Peace for the county of Cavan.

DERRY.

A meeting of tenant farmers and others was held recently in the Town-hall, Coleraine, in support of the recommendations of the Select Committee of the House of Commons on the Land Act. There was a crowded and representative assemblage.

DONEGAL.

The Ballyshannon Town Commissioners have unanimously refused to adopt the 'No confidence' resolution circulated by the Redmondites and Tory members of the Dublin Corporation.

FERMANAGH.

At the meeting of the Fermanagh Branch of the Irish Landowners' Convention recently, the Earl of Belmore explained the position of the landlords of Ireland with regard to the land question, and criticized the report of Mr. Morley's Committee. With regard to a new Land Bill, he said the Government had two courses open—either to introduce a Bill on the lines of that report, designed not to become law, but to catch votes, or on the other hand a Bill intended to cure existing evils, and do justice all round. He did not hope for such a Bill from the Government in the present position; but, if that course were to be taken it could only be on informal consultation with the leaders of both sections of the Opposition, and with representatives of landlords and tenants, and it would receive fair consideration on the part of landlords.

A marriage has been arranged between Mr. Anthony F. Maude, J.P., eldest son of Mr. Maurice Cely Maude, of Lenaghan Park, Fermanagh, and Emily, only daughter of Major H. Marcus Beresford, late of the 9th Regiment, and granddaughter of the late protestant Primate of Ireland.

MONAGHAN.

The proceedings of the meeting of the Governors of the Monaghan and Cavan Lunatic Asylum, recently, were certainly peculiar. In relation to the proposed purchase of land upon which to erect additional buildings to the existing asylum, a letter was read from the Board of Control, in Dublin Castle. In reference to the lands held by Lord Rossmore, containing 18a 2r. 26p., which the Board of Control pointed out that their valuer had placed £54 per acre on it. In 1881 when Lord Rossmore was offered a price for the 50 acres upon which the asylum now stands, he refused, and the compulsory powers being put in operation, he was compelled to accept £92 per acre—£4,600. What the Board of Control now suggested was that 'his lordship' should be offered £92 an acre, and that three years purchase of rents be paid to the tenants, not by way of tenant right, but as compensation for immediate possession. After considerable discussion, Mr. Arthur Treach moved, as an amendment, that the value be fixed at £54. Mr. Nicholas Smith seconded the amendment. The amendment was carried by nine votes to three.

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
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
