

OUR CITY PARISHES.

Rev. Felix O'Hanlon sent to Clifton Springs
—
His Work at St. Mary's—English Sermon at St. Peter and Paul's.

ST. MARY'S.

Rev. Felix O'Hanlon of St. Mary's has been appointed rector of the parishes at Clifton Springs and Shortsville. St. Mary's people regret his departure while they rejoice at his promotion.

Rev. Felix O'Hanlon was born in Ovid. He was educated in the high school there and commenced his studies for the priesthood in St. Andrew's Seminary. From there he went to Troy, where he graduated with high honors. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1888. For a few months after his ordination he was an assistant at Scottsville. He was then sent to St. Mary's as an assistant to Rev. J. P. Stewart, M. R. I. He has since remained at St. Mary's.

Father O'Hanlon has been particularly active among the young people of the parish. He took a great interest in the Young People's Society from the time of its organization until it disbanded. When the "Catholic Literary" was organized, principally of the young people of St. Mary's parish, Father O'Hanlon joined it and has been an active member ever since.

It is unusual for a young priest to be left so long as an assistant and Father O'Hanlon's name has been often mentioned during the last four years in connection with vacant parishes. In fact, last July, it was announced that Father O'Hanlon would be made pastor of the new Catholic Church to be started at the corner of Main and Williams streets in Geneva. Father Stewart's health has not been good, however, for the past few years and at times the entire charge of St. Mary's parish has devolved upon Father O'Hanlon. He performed his duties so well that Father Stewart was loath to lose his assistant and the Bishop was just as loath to change him.

The parish at Clifton Springs includes St. Dominic's Church at Shortsville and the church at Manchester. The two last named churches are not far apart. According to the latest census there are about 500 members of the church at Clifton Springs and 150 at Shortsville.

Father O'Hanlon will preach his farewell sermon at St. Mary's to-morrow. It is said Rev. Father Ferron will be the assistant at St. Mary's.

The financial statement of the Church of the Holy Apostles shows an indebtedness Jan. 1, 1894 as follows: Mortgage \$600.00 and Balance due Treasurer, \$126.25; \$124.26 indebtedness Jan. 1, 1895. Mortgage \$350; less Balance in Treasury \$91.96; \$32.04; Decrease of Debt since last annual report \$300.21.

The Russian thistle has become abundant over a large extent of country in the Dakotas, and has also been found in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas, and along the lines of railroads in Northern Illinois. The plant is said to have been brought to this country in seed from South Dakota in 1873. Perhaps the expenditure of \$1 worth of work in 1874 would have eradicated the now serious pest. It is now doubtful if it will ever be eradicated. When mature in September or October, the plant looks somewhat like the common tumbleweed of the West. It is often two or three feet high and twice as much in diameter. The color of the mature plant is crimson. The number of seeds produced by one plant often reaches many thousands. When the plant is young it is readily eaten by farm animals.

Perpetual Help Society Holds its Annual Meeting—Officers Elected.

The fourth annual meeting of the Perpetual Help Society connected with St. Mary's Hospital, was held Wednesday afternoon at the hospital. Thirty-four of the members of the society were in attendance.

Mrs. A. B. Barr, treasurer of the society, reported as follows: Received from Mrs. Pee, treasurer in 1893, \$61.11; from dues, \$118.75; dues, \$4; from donations, \$37; from special assessments, \$43; from tables, \$46.90; total, \$277.75. Disbursements: Burke, Fitzsimons, Hone & Co., for dry goods, \$62.14; J. Fahy & Co., \$2.92; postage, Miss Fulton \$3; expense of reception, \$53.41; total, \$180.53; balance on hand, \$147.19.

In her annual report the secretary, Miss Corinne L. Mahon, said that 118 members had paid their dues for 1894 and ten new members had joined.
